Gas Flooding Back Yards

DENVER—(UP)—Three families Thursday appealed for rescue from a \$2,000 flood of high test gasoline in their backyards.

The gasoline—more than 6,000 gallons retailing at 30 cents a gallon at the corner pumps—seeped into the water wells of dairy farmer Philip Schwieder, truck gardener Carl Stone and Mrs. Bonnie Perko, wife of a bus driver.

Now a Menace
First the gasoline was just a nuisance. Now it has become a menace. It has restricted them to dribbles of drinking water from deep, and so far unaffected, ar- tesian wells which also are on their property.

At the Perko residence, gaso- line fumes permeated the base- ment and forced Mrs. Perko to switch from open-flame gas cook- ing to electrical cooking because of the fire hazard.

Stone said the gasoline seeped into the soil of his truck farm and irrigation well, leaving his farm blighted with dull brown petroleum smears.

May Be Costly
Schwieder, hard pressed for enough water for his dairy herd, said "If the seepage isn't stopped, it might cost me my arm."

Nobody knows where the gaso- line is coming from. State and city officials haven't been able to trace the flow. And experts from two gasoline depots located more than a mile away said they haven't found any leakage in their tanks.

All agree that it can't be nat- ural seepage since the fluid tests out as high-octane motor fuel— with anti-knock compounds add- ed.

Check Charge Brings Three Years in Pen

Howard B. Lowery, 51, of Springfield, pleaded guilty to a charge of forgery and was sen- tenced to two years in the peni- tentiary.

Ronald Elmer Wight, 17, a Cal- ifornia boy arrested in Florence with a stolen car, was given six months in Lane County's jail.

Meanwhile two other youths were being held in connection with possession of a stolen car near Cottage Grove. James Stan- ley Ammons, 20, and Robert Wes- ley Williams, 21, both of Long- view, Wash., were arraigned this week and bound over to the grand jury after their arrest by state police.

War Materiel Supplies Forts

SALINAS, Kas. — (AP) — The Air Force clarified the status of war materiel loaded aboard freight cars at Camp Phillips for movement to the East Coast.

The supplies will be shipped to England for use by B-29 bombers now on training missions there.

Col. Leslie G. Mulzer, commander of the 301st very heavy bomb- ardment squadron at the nearby Smoky Hill Air Force Base, said in a statement Wednesday the materiel had been in storage at his base.

A report Tuesday that the large amount of equipment was being loaded aboard 240 flat cars and 80 box cars had aroused specula- tion on why it was being trans- ported. Camp Phillips, used dur- ing the war as a training post, is now deactivated.



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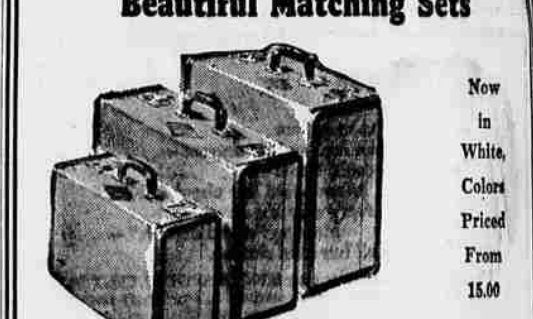


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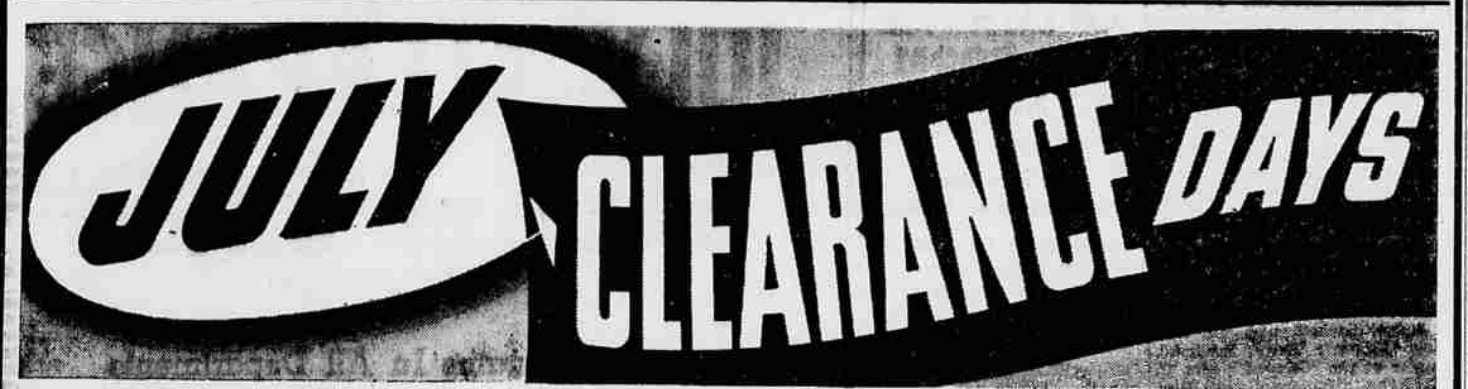
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
