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Copper Pipe Okay for Vents

The use of copper pipe for waste and vent lines in local building has been approved on an emergency basis, County Sanitarian Howard Smith reported Friday.

Smith said that he has been advised by the chief plumbing inspector for the state board of health that the copper pipe can be installed now if the owner of the building signs a letter accepting full responsibility in case of failure. Such letters will be forwarded by the plumber on the job to the state board of health at Portland.

City Building Inspector Milton E. Palleske reported that waste and vent pipe of the galvanized types previously required by the state board of health have been all but unobtainable in Eugene for the past year.

Authorization of the copper pipe as a substitute material will be a benefit to local builders beset by materials shortages, Palleske said, if the procedure works out as out-

lined in the state inspector port to Smith.

Many states have approved unrestricted use of copper pipe waste and vent lines, Palleske added.

Crown Point, Goldsboro Vote on Annexation
