Candidates Needed; C G Mayor Reminds

COTTAGE GROVE — Local organizations are busy with plans for the rodeo and regatta and various activities which will take over a majority of the social events for the remainder of this month and will also cut into August.

However a warning from city hall enters into the picture which informs the public that a deadline for registering petitions for the November election is only four weeks away and is of great importance.

According to information from Mayor H. A. Hagen and the office of city recorder D. J. Allan, the November ballot will elect a new mayor and five city councilmen. Mayor Hagen urges the voters to start an active campaign to find people qualified for the positions at once because considerable time and work are necessary in preparing the petitions and in having them signed.

Also to be elected are the city recorder and city treasurer. It is necessary to have petitions for the offices of mayor, recorder and treasurer signed by ten per cent of the registered voters of the city. Petitions bearing the names of persons for city councilmen must bear the names of ten per cent of the registered voters in the respective ward of the name on the petition.

Wards one and two must elect two councilmen each while ward three will elect only one as the office of councilman Clint Ocum-paugh is unexpired.

Recorder Allan pointed out that persons eligible to sign the petitions must be registered voters but do not have to be property owners.

Signed petitions must be in the Cottage Grove city recorder's office not later than Friday, Aug. 20 and must be in the county clerk's office in Eugene not later than Saturday, Aug. 28.

Anyone interested in the petitions may receive them at the city hall where further information will also be furnished.

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New Pipe; Green Lawns

COTTAGE GROVE—City hall officials announced this week that the first operation of the pipeline which has been under construction for the past several months has been finished with the exception of a few small details and that at this time the 19 1/2 miles of 14-inch steel pipe is being used in carrying approximately three million gallons of water from Rujada to the Cottage Grove reservoir located one-half mile east of town on the extension of Madison St. The reservoir itself has a one million gallon capacity.

The new steel pipe replaces the 12-inch wood pipe which has been in use for the past 38 years. The old line was built in 1910 at a cost to the city of about \$100,000. Voters gave an o.k. to a \$300,000 bond issue about one year ago which financed the new supply line.

During the summer months users have been consuming approximately one million gallons of water per day with a considerable part of the total amount being used in leakage.

City Engineer L. W. Colner pointed out that a number of repairs have already been made and more breaks will be taken care of as soon as pipe is available.

Water users will have 10,000 gallons per month during the irrigation season at the same rate as the usual 6000 gallon minimum rate allows.

Intercity Sand and Gravel constructed the 1 1/2 miles of line with the other 6 1/2 miles done by the United States Engineers. The portion constructed by the government follows for the most part along the road built by the engineers and is a scenic drive with the road being in good condition although it is not graded. The beginning of this section of road is located east of Cottage Grove about four miles and goes around the Douglas Dam and reservoir.

Included in the construction work were five river crossings, three underground crossings, one steel bridge crossing and one suspension bridge crossing.

Much of the line is located along the county road and the O. P. and E. Railroad. The line has been tested and chlorinated and passed all tests to the satisfaction of officials in charge.

According to a preliminary report submitted by Stevens and Koons of Portland early this spring, the next step in improving the city pipeline is to build a larger reservoir and to cover same. More work is also planned for the area above Rujada.

"Thanks, Boys." It isn't always that the fire department is as much appreciated as it was when the fire boys hurried out to the Vinal Randall Jr. ranch a week ago Friday. A hay baler back-fired and set fire to six acres of cut hay and stubble which all burned, plus 15 bales of hay. Quick action by the local fire department kept the fire from spreading and doing further damage.

Randall entertained 20 members of the fire department at a special dinner at the Rainbow to prove that he meant it when he said, "Thanks a lot, boys."
