Three young adventurers were in Eugene over the weekend on the first leg of a 20,000-mile trip across the continent, through British Columbia, down the East Coast to Cuba—Mexico and then back home to San Francisco.

The trip is expected to take approximately eight months and furnish material for a book—"Adventures Unlimited"—the trio plan to write.

Enthusiastic archers, all three—Nikki Charles, husband Maurice Charles, and Leo Theroux, Jr.—they plan to subsist as nearly as possible by the skill of their bows and arrows. A dalmatian dog, answering to "Topper," is part of the safari.

Transportation is furnished by

jeep on the drier ground and canoe on the wet portions. With no fire-arms aboard, their meager budget will be supplemented by shooting predatory animals for bounty fees and game animals in season.

Their arsenal consists of nine bows—average pull 50 pounds—and 1000 arrows. And hearts full of adventure. The fruits of this will be recorded in a daily diary and put into the form of a book for a New York publisher.
