

'King John' Has Share of Thrills, Equal to Movies

ASHLAND—Just as exciting as a western thriller movie, comments Director Angus L. Bowmer about the play "King John" which will be presented here during the Oregon Shakespeare Festival. The play is the first of Shakespeare's historical series and is very seldom on the modern stage.

"Old King John could have given Gene Autrey a run for his money," the Southern Oregon College English professor continues, "and we strongly advise that the youngsters be warned to hang onto their seats during the showing of this play. The authentic period costumes which we are making for the production will add much to the enjoyment of the audience."

The role of King John will be

taken by John Hume of Sacramento, a graduate student at Stanford University, while the leading role of Philip the Bastard will be played by Richard Graham of Los Angeles, a former professional actor who has appeared with Katharine Cornell on Broadway and has played in motion pictures. Frank Buchter of Medford, who played the role of Macbeth last summer, will appear as Cardinal Pandolph.

The leading feminine role of Queen Eleanor will be taken by Miss Suzanne LaMarre of Ashland, and Mrs. Kathryn Hume will play Constance. "King John" is the third of the four plays to be presented during the festival and will first be staged on Friday evening, Aug. 13.

SUMMER GREENS MANY. WAYS OF COOKING TOLD

With both the budget and good nutrition in mind, it's a good idea to pay special attention to the many cooking greens in the grocery stores or in the family garden.

Among the many excellent cooking greens are tender beet tops, Swiss chard, collard, kale, spinach and turnip tops. These greens can be an inexpensive treat for the dinner table if they are cooked with care and seasoned with imagination.

To cook greens, wash well in several changes of water. Trim away tough portions and damaged or darkened leaves. A porcelain enameled sauce pot is ideal for cooking greens because it is wide and deep enough to allow ample room for the fresh greens and because the finish is resistant to stains.

Cook the greens, covered, in a small amount of boiling, salted water. Cook on high heat until the greens steam, then turn the heat low and steam for 5 to 10 minutes—until tender. Drain and chop. Season as desired.

There are many ways to add variety to greens. Here are a few:

1. Serve with wedges of lemon or hard-cooked eggs.
2. Mix with sautéed onion, bacon or mushrooms.
3. Add a piece of salt pork to the greens during cooking.
4. Serve with a tangy sauce or with melted butter.

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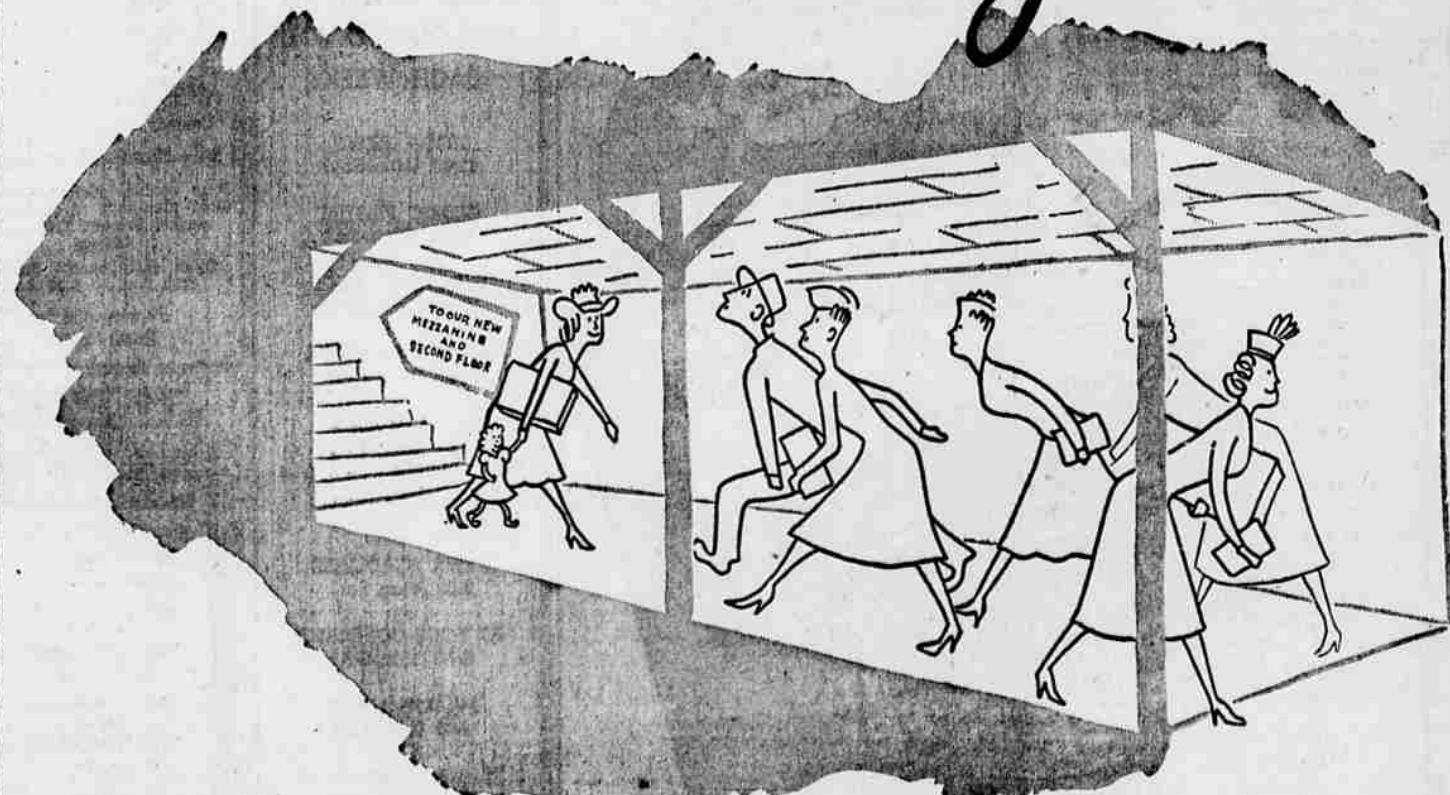
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
