Polio Rate Rising All Over Country

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Infantile paralysis is "going up a little bit in other parts of the country" outside of the three states already hard hit, the public health service reported Thursday.

All states except Rhode Island have now reported some cases.

"Epidemic proportions, however, are still being reported only in North Carolina, Texas and California," the service said.

"There has been little more than normal expectancy in many of the other states, but so far, reports don't indicate any epidemic proportions."

Latest reports from the states, for the week ended July 24, tallied 963 new cases for the nation. This compared with 717 the week before; 154 for the corresponding week in 1947 and 668 in the comparable week in 1946—which eventually proved to be the second worst polio year on record.

Latest figures bring to 4586 the nation's total for the year, as of July 24, compared with 1573 for the comparable period last year, and 3260 for the same period in 1946.

City Manager System Under Fire in Salem

SALEM — (AP) — A movement to abolish Salem's city manager system of government, which has been in effect only 18 months, was under way Thursday.

A committee, headed by organizations, was attempting to get such a proposal on the election ballot next November.

The proposal would abolish city manager form, and substitute the commission form of government.

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
