

Television Said Not Yet Profitable

LOS ANGELES — (U.P.) — Television stations probably won't even break even financially for two or three more years, Sidney N. Strotz, vice-president in charge of television for the National Broadcasting Co., said Thursday. The industry is suffering

"growing pains," said Strotz on his return from a tour of his firm's television facilities in the Midwest and East. "People who say they're making money in television are kidding themselves," he said. Strotz predicted that the number of television set owners probably will double every six months for some time to come. He said he "may have been optimistic" in a previous prediction

that the nation would have a coast-to-coast coaxial television cable by 1953. In the meantime, he advocated a Seattle-to-San Diego loop to meet West Coast needs.

Bethlehem Cuts Some Steel Prices

NEW YORK — (U.P.) — Bethlehem Steel Co. Wednesday cut prices on 27 of its products from \$1 to \$3 a ton. The reductions followed by one week price increases ranging from m\$2 to \$12 a ton on others of its products. "The adjustment in price," the company said, "was made in order to meet competition which he found to exist in certain of our products."

The widest cut was in galvanized copper bearing culvert sheets which were reduced \$3 a ton.

Items reduced included: new billet concrete reinforcing bars, forged steel axles, various sized rails, hot rolled open hearth and carbon steel bars.
