American Farmers Suffering From Over-Dose of Prosperity

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — (AP) — Prosperity is deluging the farmer this year but neither the farmer nor the grainman knows what can be done with the tremendous crops.
Where just six months ago America was worrying about how it would feed a hungry world and maintain marginal grain stocks for itself, it now is wondering what to do with more than 6,000,000,000 bushels of all grains coming from its farms.
There is no storage space for it and foreign demand has been reduced by the worst crops since before the war.
"It's the worst situation that has ever confronted the grain trade," Frank A. Theis, chairman of the Kansas City joint terminal grain committee, said Friday.
In this major terminal, there is no space for another bushel of wheat. Grain on tracks here awaiting unloading will fill every available bit of storage space. Wheat is piled on the farms in the breadbasket belt. Much has been shipped as so-called free wheat, wheat for immediate sale.

Dockmen Refuse To Work Sundays

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Pacific Coast waterfront employers claimed Friday that a decision of CIO longshoremen not to work on Sundays was a violation of a Federal Court order forbidding "interference in any manner" with normal cargo handling.
The CIO International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union announced its members would not work from 6 a.m. Sunday to 8 a.m. Monday.
The employers charged that the

decision was part of a "slowdown program" that is costing the longshoremen more than \$13,000 in weekly wage losses and decreasing port efficiency by nearly 10 per cent.
Payroll records, they said, showed that 9.2 per cent of the San Francisco port cargo handling is normally performed on Sundays at the over time rate. In addition, they said, sailings of an estimated six ships a Sunday will be delayed from 12 to 24 hours.
