Empey Takes JCUHS Job

JUNCTION CITY—Warne G. Empey, Junction City's grade school principal, moves up to take over the high school principal's job, succeeding Virgil Kingsley who is taking the Cottage Grove Union High School superintendency. (See page one story.)

Empey was principal of the Pleasant Hill High School for five years, then was at La Grande in 1942 and '43 as assistant principal and dean of boys, and to Coburg for two years as superintendent of schools. In 1945 he became principal of the Junction City Grade School and has held that position until the present time.

He is a graduate of the Linfield College. He is now working on his master's degree at University of Oregon. He was president of the Lane County High School Principals' Assn., for two years, and last year he was president of the Elementary Principals' Assn. for Lane County. He is a member of the advisory committee of the Rural School Board. He is a Mason, member of the Lions Club, and belongs to the Methodist Church. He and Mrs. Empey have four children: Donald, who will be a junior in high school, Darlene, who will be a sophomore; Gary, who will be a fourth grader, and Gordon, three.

During Empey's term as head of the grade school, the district was consolidated with a number of smaller districts, which has resulted in plans for a \$250,000 grade school to be built.

Marcola Folks Check Wells for Pollution

MARCOLA—A word to the wise from Howard Smith of the Lane County Health Department, for those living in out-lying territories:

Smith advises that water from private wells should be tested at least twice a year.

The majority of wells already tested in this vicinity have been judged unfit for human consumption.

Typhoid fever is the most common disease caused by polluted water, i.e., dysentery, or what we often call stomach flu is also caused by water unfit to drink.

Samples of your water will be tested free of charge by the health department, and containers for this purpose can be obtained by calling at the Lane County Health Office located on the ground floor of the Court House in Eugene.

If the tests of your water show pollution, and before sending another test in, use one pint of chlorine compound, such as chlorox, purex, etc., to the usual shallow well. Allow to stand 24 hours without disturbing, then pump through entire system until all odor is gone. Use water two to three days then submit another sample for testing.

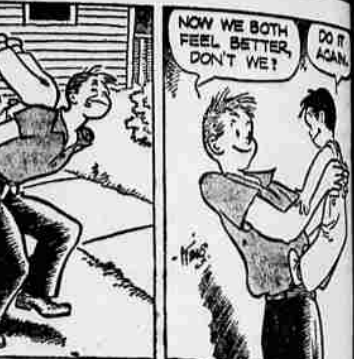

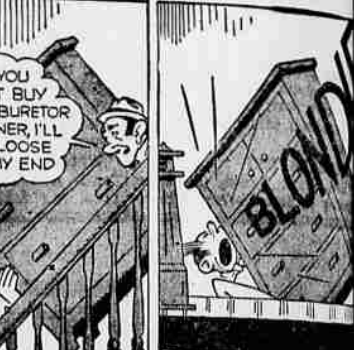

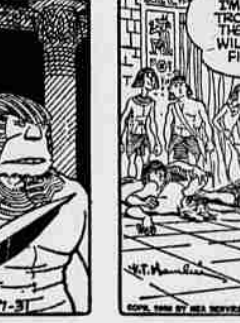
