

Planners, Council Set Meets In Springfield During Week

SPRINGFIELD—A Monday planning commission session and a Tuesday night special city council meeting will be held at the council chamber in the city hall, Fred Chestham, city manager, said Saturday.

The planning commission will meet at 8 p.m. to reconsider the zoning recommendations for the newly annexed areas in accordance with the requests of the city council.

Two areas in particular will be studied by the commission. The first is between 20th and 22nd, from Main south to the alley between Main and South A; the second, an area along the south side of Cedar street near the intersection with Ash.

A light industrial classification is sought for the first area, and a heavy industrial for the second.

The commission will also consider a special request by Elmer Stone, who seeks permission to build a duplex at 704 F Street.

Sewer Report
Purpose of Tuesday's adjourned council meeting is the public hearing on the engineer's report concerning two sewer improvement projects.

Construction of a sanitary sewer between F and G, and 10th and 11th streets is one of the projects to be reported upon. The cost is estimated at \$5782.11, and the costs will be assessed to the property holders in the area.

Chamber Sets Budget Goal

SPRINGFIELD—A budget goal of over \$9000 was approved last week by the Chamber of Commerce here.

The \$9460 budgeted for operations between now and June 30 of next year represents an \$800 increase over the \$8,678 allocated last year. However the chamber spent only \$8000 for the 1947-48 year.

In addition to the \$3850 salary budgeted for the new manager's salary, an additional \$500 expense account was voted for him. Other principal items included \$2000 for a secretary, and \$100 for promotional work.

A drive for next year's funds will start early in August. Marvin O. Sanders, Chamber president, reported at the meeting. A membership drive is planned for the same time.

SPRINGFIELD—No fires. That's the order put out by Fire Chief Harry Melson Saturday morning. The continuous dry spell makes outside burning too hazardous, and until the rains come again, Melson said that the fire permits will not be issued.

Chief Melson also recommended that Springfield citizens have their chimneys cleaned in the near future. This is the best time of the year to clean them out—before the rains come, he said.

It is also the most hazardous period for flue and roof fires, and a good cleaning now will prevent possible home blazes.

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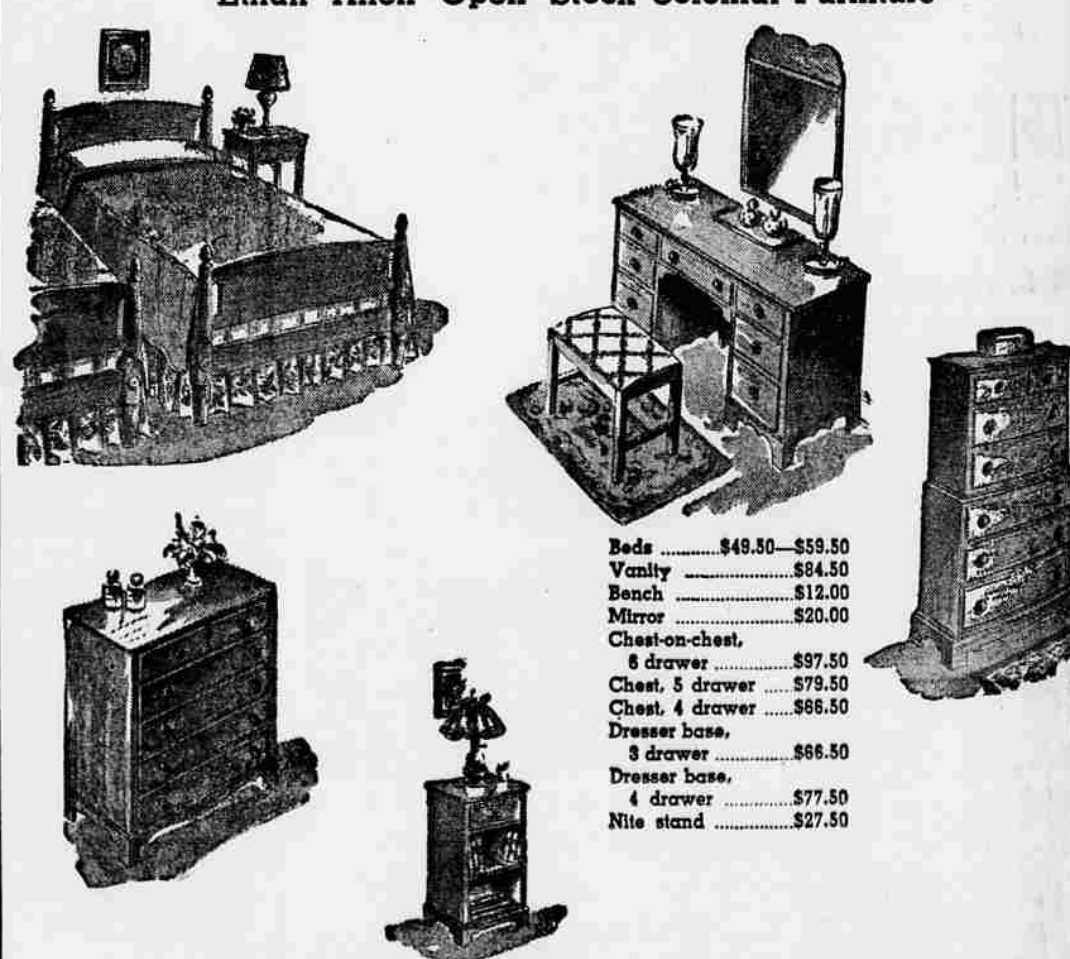
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
