## Bushmen Said Nearing Doom As Australia Whites Expand

The Australian aborigines are a dying race and, like the American Indian, owe their gradual reduction in numbers to the progress of the white man. Ernest G. Moll, professor of English at the University of Oregon, sketched the story of the bushmen in a lecture on the campus Monday night.

At present, there are approximately 75,000 of the native Australians and Moll estimates that within 50 years there will be only "a few thousand left."

**Food Gone**  
Most of the tribal lands of the natives have been stripped of forage by the huge herds of cattle, one of Australia's principal industries, and the result is starvation for the bushmen as their game becomes extinct.

"The government gathers together many of the tribes in various camps to provide them with food," the professor related, but this process in itself violates one of the main tribal beliefs—that all aborigines must live and die on their tribal lands. To do otherwise denies them entrance into a peaceful hereafter."

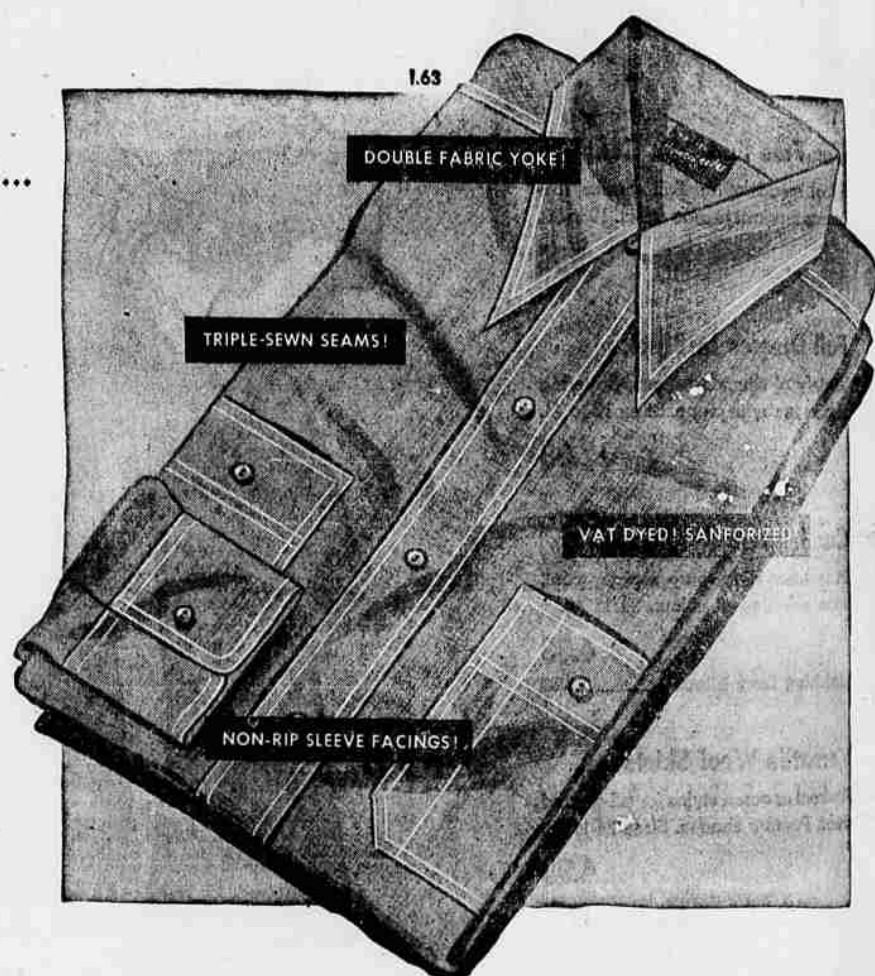

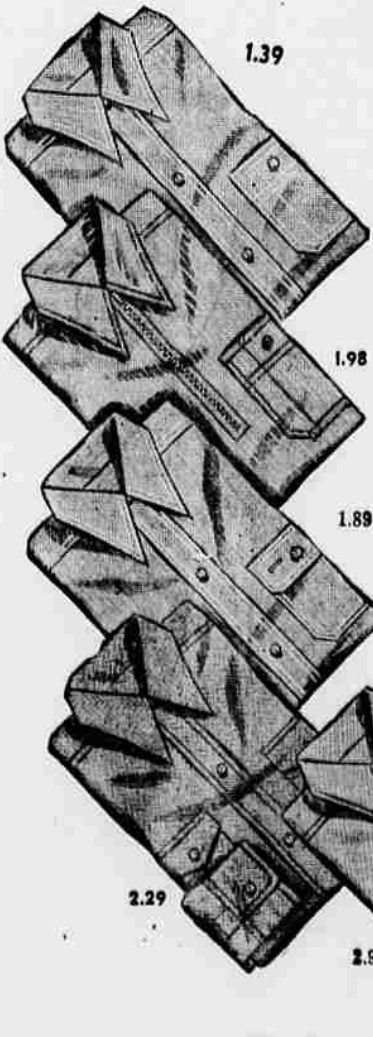
