Garden Club Plans to Add Rooms, Improve Clubhouse

GARDEN CLUB PLANS—2-8 Executive Board of the Eugene Garden Club held a picnic in the garden of Mrs. J. M. Cornutt, Friday afternoon. After luncheon Mrs. Fred Broders told of the plans outlined by the Board of Trustees, and an architectural committee, for an addition to the clubhouse. Two rooms will be built on the south side of the present building. These can be used separately for the various club activities, or by opening sliding doors they, together with the present building, can be made into one large room for regular meetings of the whole club membership. It was found during the past year that when popular speakers were presented, some who wished to attend had to be turned away. There also was not enough room to invite exhibitors at the different shows, from out-of-town growers. A new front and different entrance is also included in the plans. The club has a membership of two hundred and forty-two, and they hope to increase that considerably this year. The board voted as one to recommend that the president, Mrs. L. M. The board also voted unanimously to recommend the proposal to the club; in fact, they are enthusiastically back of the project and resolved to make the larger and improved clubhouse a real addition to community life. Cancer First In Death List

Among women between the ages of thirty-five and fifty-five cancer is the leading cause of death, yet when the Women's Home Companion polled a national cross-section of its millions of women readers, eighty-seven percent confessed that they had never been examined by a competent cancer specialist. In an article analyzing results of the poll in the August issue, the magazine points out that thousands of women might be saved if they would take advantage of already established cancer information and treatment. Cancer in women, according to medical experience, is more likely than not to start in the breast or genital system and "so long as we don't go to a good doctor for a breast and pelvic examination every year we are in effect driving in the dark down a hazardous road."

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From these statistics it appears that educated women are counting on Lady Luck to keep them free of cancer. Since luck is nothing to count on, the magazine outlines various various methods of cancer control recommended by leading cancer specialists. These methods range from a simple personal test that women can use to watch for cancer of the breast, to an elaborate Cancermobile—a completely equipped hospital car and staff—which is in use in Kentucky. Of those who commented on their answers to the poll questions forty-two complained that their doctors were either too busy or too negligent to give them satisfactory examinations. The article suggests that women in various communities, to combat these negative attitudes, might interest two or three physicians trained in gynecology to organize a cooperative cancer control center such as the one established by Dr. Catharine Macfarlane at the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. However complete the medical knowledge about cancer is real progress will be made only when each woman assumes full responsibility for the dissemination and use of this knowledge, the magazine article states.
