**Smith Given Marshall Post**  
 Allan Hugh Smith, assistant professor of law at the University of Oregon, Thursday was named one of seven efficiency experts to work on the Marshall Plan.  
 The appointments were announced by the Economic Cooperation Administration, which said the experts are to "assist in the improvement of program and authorization procedures."  
 Smith left Eugene June 17 this year to fill a post in the General Counsel's office in Washington, D.C. Dean Orlando J. Hollis of the university school of law said it was his understanding Smith would return to the campus in the fall.  
 The professor in June completed his second year at the university in June. He is a graduate of the University of Santa Clara, and took his L.L.B. degree from Harvard in 1942.  
 He served on the staff of the general counsel of the War Production Board from August, 1942, until October, 1945. He is 30 years old and his home is in Portland.

**Smoke Bomb Hits Univis Plant Area**  
 DAYTON, O.—(AP)—A smoke bomb was hurled from a speeding car and exploded in the area of the troop-guarded Univis Lens Co. plant Friday. There were no casualties.  
 National guardsmen, called by Gov. Thomas J. Herbert four days ago to prevent fresh picket line skirmishes at the Strike-bound plant, ducked for cover as the bomb exploded.  
 There were ten guards in the vicinity when the box, containing three paper bags filled with gun powder, was hurled near the plant.

**Ford Workers Picket Plant**  
 LOS ANGELES—(AP)—Production workers threw a picket line around Ford Motor Company's Lincoln-Mercury assembly plant Friday to protest the firing of a United Auto Workers (CIO) member.  
 Production at the four-month-old plant stopped Thursday when all production workers walked out after Amos Fitch was discharged, assertedly for union activities. The factory turned out about 60 Mercurys and 40 Lincolns a day.  
 The company said 700 workers were out, but the union placed the figure at 1100 to 1200. No union has been chosen to represent employees, but the UAW has petitioned for a bargaining election.  
 UAW regional director C. V. O'Halloran said the walkout was spontaneous, and that he would try to get Fitch rehired and the workers back on the job.  
 Fitch, union organizer at a Pennsylvania Ford plant in 1934, was hired June 9. Company spokesmen said he was still on a 60-day probationary period. The company said his record was unsatisfactory. He has been acting as secretary of the unofficial plant local.

**Four Drivers Cited After Car Accidents**  
 City police Friday reported the citing of four drivers for alleged traffic violations, after investigation of accidents in the city Thursday.  
 Those cited and the location of the accidents included: James Fred Frantz, 91 North Polk St., failure to yield right-of-way while backing out of a driveway at 860 Olive St.;  
 Louis Huber, 36 Jefferson St., failure to yield right-of-way in collision at Eighth Ave. and Jefferson St.;  
 Maynard Peters, 540 Adams St., following too close behind another vehicle at Eleventh Ave. and Van Buren St.;  
 Charles M. Thomas, West Eighth Apartments, cited for making left turn from a right lane, accident at Sixth Ave. and Madison St.  
 All four accidents caused minor vehicle damage and no injuries.  
 Among objects which in the past have served as money are metals, furs, sheep, skins, cattle, skulls, grains, tobacco, olive oil and salt.

**County Road Labor Sought**  
 Will Lane County's much maligned road system be ready for another long winter?  
 "Today there are vacancies we can't fill on all road crews," says Commissioner Allen Wheeler.  
 Despite the common labor pay scale of \$8.40 for an eight-hour day, men are not turning out for the jobs. They show up, look the work over, and promise to come back, but that's the last seen of them, says Wheeler.  
 "Too many floaters, looking for quick easy money, is the problem," reports Roadmaster Fred Smegley, who does most of the hiring at county's maintenance sheds near Ferry Street Bridge.  
 The urgency of the need for men in Oregon's short dry season stems from the heavy logging traffic over county roads, Wheeler says.  
 If roads are poorly ditched, seepage undermines the foundation, and the heavy truck wheels beat oiled surfaces into a pulp. "Then the complaints pile up," says County Surveyor P. M. Morse, who is hoping for a long dry season.

**Youth Hostellers On Last Lap of Tour**  
 VANCOUVER, B. C.—(AP)—A group of 28 United States Youth Hostellers under the direction of Nell Beaton, 63-year-old school teacher from Reading, Mass., passed through here Friday on the last lap of a 10,000-mile train and bicycle tour of Canada and the United States.  
 The group left New York June 23 and plans to return there Aug. 24. They estimate they had cycled about 1,000 miles on the tour.
