Deerhorn-Leaburg To Vote on Merge

DEERHORN — Notices of a special election to be held Aug. 12 at the Deerhorn schoolhouse have been sent to the clerk, Mrs. Harry Deckert. The meeting was ordered by the Lane County Boundary Board upon request of the taxpayers by petition, to vote on consolidating the Deerhorn and Leaburg districts so that two more of the small schools will be eliminated.

This has been the trend for several years, and especially since the new standards for all the schools in the state have demanded drastic improvements to conform to the requirements of the state board of education.

The Deerhorn School was reported "conditionally standard" indicating that improvements would be required in the building if school is to be maintained with the help of the basic school funds. The major repairs would be: new floors or new surface; improved plumbing; better artificial and window-lighting; new interior painting; and provision for storage space.

Many of the smaller items have been taken care of by the board and the local P.T.A. At present Deerhorn is a two-room school with an enrollment of 38 pupils. Leaburg has three available school rooms, two of which have been in use for the past several years. The combined enrollment of the two schools would approximate about 80 pupils, which would probably be taught by three teachers, if the consolidation carries in both districts.

The polls will be open from 8 to 9 p.m. for all legal voters in this district whose names appeared on the last tax roll.

The property qualification is necessary to vote on measures involving transaction of school property.

All taxpayers are urged to inform themselves and to vote so that the decision will be truly representative of the desires of the residents of Deerhorn.

The board members, Ernest Watson, Leland Shrode and Bob Marquardt as well as the clerk can furnish information on the conditions and estimated costs.

If the consolidation fails in either Leaburg or Deerhorn, the two schools will continue to operate as they have been. Both districts will vote on the question at the same hour.

JC Council

JUNCTION CITY — Dr. R. S. Rogers, at city council meeting this week, described the condition of stagnant water in many sections of Junction City, particularly as caused by the improvements and new construction now being done, and recommended that property-owners and city get busy to oil the water to prevent infestation by mosquitoes.

The council approved an advance in the rates of Cecil Hunt, operator of Junction City's taxi service, from 25c for the first two-thirds of a mile, to 35c for the first mile. The 25c rate has been in effect about two years.

Residents in the area of Holly Street between Tenth and Eleventh, appeared to complain about the fact that the work the S. P. and S. Railroad Company is doing, in elevating its tracks, will make the sidewalks impassable when the rainy season comes. The work, residents said, also makes it impossible to park their cars along the street. The council referred the matter to the street and alley department. A petition to install a street light at Third and Deal Streets was also referred to the committee.

"No Parking" will be the rule with yellow strips to be painted, at the intersection of Fifth, Seventh, and Eighth Streets with Ivy Street.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Law and daughter, Christina are leaving this week to make their home in Eugene.

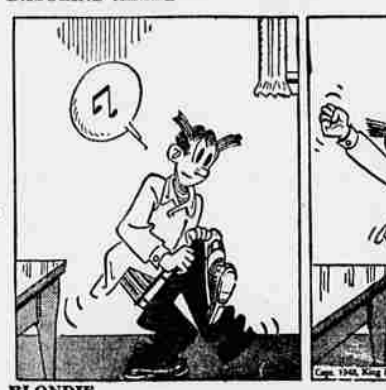
