**California
To Save Time**
SACRAMENTO, CAL.—(U)—
State officials indicated Friday
that California will stay on day-
light saving time to conserve
power after other states revert
to standard time next month.
Gov. Earl Warren's decision in
the matter depended on an analysis
of California's water and power
situation, now being prepared
by the Public Utilities Commission.
E. W. McNaughton of the com-
mission staff pointed out that De-
cember was a critical power month.
He said the commission may be
reluctant to relax power con-
servation measures unless later
year reserves may be counted on.
An official of the Federal Bureau
of Reclamation, Ben W. Creim,
said a September return to
standard time would be "extre-
mely dangerous."

Landing of Supplies at Alaska
Base is Race Against Ice Pack

POINT BARROW, Alaska—(AP)
looks like an invasion beachhead
—America's northernmost base
Friday.
Out at sea, huge Navy attack
transports stand at anchor. Land-
ing craft shuttle between ship and
shore. Mountains of oil drums and
crates pile up on the beach.
Portable generators whine on
the shore as navy signalmen trans-
mit messages by wireless and
blinker to the "invasion" head-
quarters—the flagship. Weasels,
tractors and cranes are a moving
maze between supply stacks and
warehouses.
Feverish Action
There is a sense of urgency to
the feverish unloading pace, similar
to a wartime beachhead. The foe,
this time, is the polar ice pack.
The scene is the Navy's yearly
landing of supplies for its oil ex-
ploration base on the upper tip of
Alaska.
The supply vessels anchored
offshore here Thursday. They had
raced here from Seattle with word
of the ice breakup only to be bar-
red from reaching Barrow for two
days by shifting ice.
Travel Delay
Today, helicopters and amphib-
ious courses the edge of the mas-
sive white thicket that caps the
north, ready to warn the supply
fleet to up anchor if it begins again
to move toward shore.
The arrival of the ships was like
Christmas in August to the natives
as well as to the Navy personnel
here. Men, women and children

trooped out of the native village
onto the beach, shouting "umik-
puk, umikpuk!"—the Eskimo
equivalent of "big boat."
The vessels also brought 2000
tons of freight for the village. It
must last until next summer when
the ice breaks up again for an all
too short period.
Federal officials had reported
the natives short of supplies be-
fore the Navy expedition arrived.
Native leaders said they expect
shortages in many items before
next summer despite the fact that
the present shipment is the largest
ever received.
Navy crews are scheduled to
work 12-hour shifts, 24 hours a
day until the supply vessels are
unloaded. On their side in the race
against the ice is the continuous
daylight. The sun sets for only 90
minutes, and then barely beneath
the rim of the earth.
