

17-Year Old Takes Olympic Decathlon

LONDON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The University of Washington qualified for the semi-finals of the Olympic four with coxswain rowing competition by defeating Finland by three lengths in the third heat of Saturday's quarter-finals at Henley-On-Thames. The times were seven minutes, 21.4 seconds.

G. E. Rosso of Uruguay eliminated Jack Kelly of Philadelphia from the Olympic singles sculls competition when he defeated the favored U. S. rower in a semi-final heat at the Henley also.

British fans, still slightly stunned at seeing 17-year-old Bob Mathias of Tulare, Cal., crowned decathlon champion Friday night, wondered if another young Yank of the same age would come through to win a title.

The favorite to win the men's 1,500 meter free style swim is 17-year-old Jimmy McLane of Akron, O. Also carrying the Stars and Stripes will be Forbes H. Norris of Harvard and Bill Heusner of Northwestern.

Mathias really stunned the fans when he captured the decathlon title—the idea of a 17-year-old schoolboy beating full-grown men in that most gruelling of Olympic events.

Bob had to conquer the element to come through, too, because the last five events Friday were held in a driving rain. For 12 hours Mathias proved his mettle in the 110-meter high hurdles, the pole vault, the discus throw, javelin throw, and finally, the 1,500 meter run. He finished with a total of 7,139 points, while I. Heinrich of France took second with 6,974 and Floyd Simmons of Los Angeles was third with 6,954.

Mangrum Grabs First Money At Tam O'Shanter

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Lloyd Mangrum won a double prize of \$10,000 Friday, sweating out a futile late rally by Bobby Locke to capture the annual George S. May Tam O'Shanter tourney.

Locke was second and Jimmy Demaret, the dressiest pro of them all, rallied for a 68 Friday and a 281 total to take third money of \$2500.

At 282 four men were tied and each won \$1562.50. They were Herman Barrow, the 1946 winner, Pete Cooper, Henry Ransom and Dick Metz.

Mangrum, tied for second place at the start of the final round, blasted a four-under-par 68 for a 72-hole total of 277. Then he changed his clothes and went to the 18th green to watch Locke finish.

The South African star began his drive on the 15th, sending an approach shot within two feet of the pin for a birdie. He parred the 16th with a three and then needed only one birdie on the final two holes to tie Mangrum.

On the 17th his approach again was perfect and he canned a five foot putt for that bird. But disaster struck him on the final hole. He tried to fade his second shot around a tree to the right of the green. Instead it hit a branch and plopped into a creek. When Locke missed his chip, Mangrum was in, and he mopped his brow and sank into a chair to accept congratulations. Locke finished with a 71.

Although first prize in the tourney carried only \$5000 first money, May had promised Mangrum a \$500 bonus if he was the leading winner at the end of Friday's play. The first money carried the slender Texan slightly ahead of Ben Hogan into first place.
