

Foreign Students' Histories War Years' Turbulence

She was in no hurry. She was walking down the street, where the people were especially worried about the concrete sidewalks and where window shops were closed.

to educators and leaders of international scope. This Quaker-sponsored group has been almost silently studying during the past six weeks in Eugene. Studying history, government, economics, and, principally, means of bringing peace to the world.

Ends Aug. 14
Their seventh week begins Monday and the session will end Aug. 14.

Dr. Frank Munk, an international authority on the United Nations and related political and economic questions, took a week off from Reed College in Portland to be a visiting faculty member.

"Their brief biographies will indicate how rich have been the experiences shared at the local seminar," said Dr. Allen Cole, NCC professor of Far Eastern history and International Relations.

Background
Here follows a brief resume of the background of a few of Sylvia's colleagues, picked from the session at random:

Karel Holbik is from Czechoslovakia but traveled through nine countries of Europe before coming to the University of Detroit to study business administration. His father is an official in the state railroad system of the homeland.

During the war, Karel was employed by the famous Bata Shoe Corp., which has a plant in Maryland. He intends to take a master's degree at Detroit, but his plans thereafter are uncertain.

Turk Studies
Erden Ergin from Istanbul, Turkey, came to the seminar from Bozeman, Mont., where he is studying mechanical engineering at Montana State.

He reports that Turkey's public educational system is more like the French and German types. He was sent to America by a beet sugar corporation for which he will work after his return home.

Ingela Keup has had many adventures. Her father was a German banker who refused to bow to Nazi policies and became a voluntary exile soon after Hitler seized power. Before this, Ingela had learned spoken French and English from friends who spent the summers as guests in her family's Mecklenburg estate.

In Paris
She was one of a score of students now at Northwest College for what is termed International Service Seminars. Students from a number of European and American countries are here, but avidly, listening

The exiled family settled in Paris for six years, and Ingela there studied fine arts and languages. One of the schools she attended was the Ecole des Beaux Arts. When, in 1940, the Reichswehr overwhelmed France, the Gestapo arrested Herr Keup and imprisoned him in Berlin. The family returned to Germany and endured the saturation bombing of the capital and the destitution of the post-war years. Ingela left Berlin last June, just before the Soviet blockade began.

Peru Student
Francisco Carrillo from Peru is a student of Spanish, English and American literatures at the University of Washington in Seattle. There he is an assistant in Romance languages. On the side, he studies toward a master's degree and perhaps later a doctoral degree.

Although salaries of teachers in Peru are still lower than in the United States, "Paco" (as he is called by fellow students) intends to go home to teach.

Trinidad
Nelson Scott is from the densely populated and cosmopolitan West Indian island of Trinidad. He comes to Eugene from the University of Nebraska, where he has been studying architecture. He says Trinidad needs more honest architects.

Mary Olga Filippi has a law degree from an underground university which operated in Poland during wartime. Later she taught English in a similar institution and did interpreting.

Chicago
Last year, she received a fellowship from the Polish-American Kosciuszko Foundation, which has enabled her to study English and American literature at the University of Chicago.

If the names of these students or others of the 21 attending the seminar sound like a roll call of the United Nations, don't be amazed. Someday they may well be just that.

Siamese to Try Five Politicians

BANGKOK—(U.P.)—Five prominent Siamese political personalities have been ordered placed on trial in connection with the death of King Ananda of Siam, who was found shot to death in his bedroom on June 9, 1946, the government announced Saturday.

The public prosecutor has been ordered to begin criminal prosecution of "an act of violence against the King and making false evidence to conceal a crime," the government said.

Go To Trial
Three of the five, who have been held since last November's coup when the government of Premier Luan Thamrong Nawasawat was overthrown, will be placed on trial immediately.

They are Chalew Patumrot, private secretary of the late king, and two royal attendants, Nai Chit and Nai But.

Fugitives
Two others wanted for trial are now fugitives, the announcement said. They are Pardi Banomyong, senior statesman and premier at the time of the king's death, and his aide, Naval Li. Vajarachai Chaiyasithiwet.

The announcement climaxed two years of continued investigation of the death of the 20-year-old king. The investigation has been shrouded with secrecy and associated with violent political upheavals.

Medical Report
An investigation by a 20-man medical board said the 20-year-old king probably was assassinated. The report, made public three weeks after the king's death, said he had been killed by a gun held seven and one half inches from his forehead.

A government announcement of the time of the death said the king was found dead in bed and that his death was accidental. The public refused to accept this explanation and there were frequent demonstrations by Siamese crowds demanding that the mystery be cleared.
