

Report Shows 4 Lane Deaths

A report compiled by the Lane County Health Department revealed a total of 94 deaths in the county during July.

Of the total, 45 were attributed to heart disease as the principal cause.

Deaths from other causes were: cancer, 6; intracranial lesions of various origin, 7; communicable diseases, 8; nephritis, 1; tuberculosis, 2; motor accidents, 5; and other accidents, 7. There were five stillbirths and three still births.

There were 20 cases of communicable disease reported during July. There were 13 cases of measles, 2 of mumps and one each of diphtheria, gonorrhea and scarlet fever. No cases of diphtheria, pneumonia, meningitis, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, tuberculosis or whooping cough were reported. The total communicable disease cases were seven less than reported in July, 1947.

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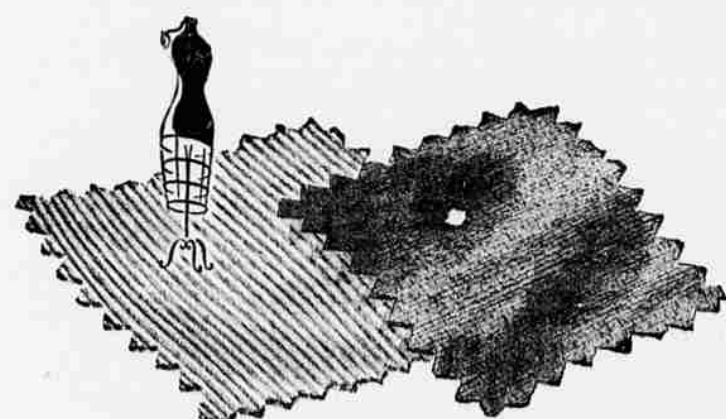
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
