Highlight Actions Of City Council

Indicative of the large amount of municipal improvement being accomplished in the city this summer were bills presented to the city council at its first August meeting Monday evening.

Contractors engaged on street, sidewalk and sewer projects—and the now nearly completed municipal swimming pool—presented claims totalling \$70,753.80 for work done by them during the month of July.

Payment of the July bills, certified by the city engineer and the contractors, was authorized in a series of voice votes by the council.

The council Monday night also took action aimed at alleviating the traffic congestion around Eugene's postoffice. Hours during which limited parking will be allowed on Fifth Ave. and Willamette St. adjacent to the postoffice were extended. Previously parking controls were exercised only between 9 a. m. and 6 p. m.

Hereafter—and effective immediately—parking will be limited on the west side of Willamette and north side of Fifth from 6 a. m. to 10 p. m.

The council added an emergency clause to its amendment of the general parking ordinance to make the change enforceable at once. Parking spaces directly in front of the postoffice can be used only for five minutes at a time without charge while other nearby spaces are limited for just 12 minutes' parking time and are equipped with parking meters.

Further study of the postoffice parking problem was ordered by the council after a suggestion that truck parking might advantageously be prohibited in the street in front of the much-used building.

Power generating equipment acquired in purchasing the Mill-race was sold to Henry Berk, Portland, at Monday night's meeting when the council accepted payment for an additional \$7125 for the machinery. Berk had previously paid \$375 to obtain an option on the equipment.

A rezoning request from Earl J. Clark, 1543 Fifteenth Ave. E., asking a neighborhood business classification on property now zoned for two-family residential occupancy, was forwarded to the City Planning Commission. The property concerned is located on the northeast corner of Eleventh and Adams.

The council also voted at Monday's session to establish a policy of entertaining future rezoning petitions only if they are entered by the owner of the property concerned.

No charge is being made at the city garbage dump now for the intermittent dumping of rubbish collected by city householders. City Manager Deane Seeger told the council Monday.

Previously, all dumping required fee payments, but under a new policy only regular users of the dump are charged for use of the facility. This liberalization, Seeger stressed, is intended to encourage individual property owners to keep their properties cleaned up and not to favor parties whose normal business operations require frequent disposal trips.

A proposal to buy a strip of city-owned land 70 by 334 feet near the Eleventh Ave. site of the new Naval armory was received from Gordon W. Elliott and referred to the council's finance committee.

Other communications to the council included a request from the University of Oregon for an endorsement of the school's application for title to veterans' housing units erected on Columbia St. and in the Amazon Flat under the federal Lenham Act. Congress this summer approved legislation providing for transfers to title on emergency housing projects to schools and other public agencies. The endorsement was approved by council vote.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Benston 1603 Polk St., filed a claim for damages with the council stating that a bulldozer working on a sewer project mistakenly levelled a large number of oak trees on their property. The council referred this matter to its judiciary committee to determine the extent of the city's liability and the extent to which the contractor on the project was liable.

A request from Warren N. Korstad that he be permitted to erect street corner benches for waiting bus company patrons was referred to the planning commission. Korstad, who submitted a copy of the Portland city ordinance governing such installations, said he intends to use the benches for outdoor advertising purposes and that they would be erected only where consent of the property owners had been obtained, not in the downtown business district.

Another request from Don Dubois, 360 Eleventh Ave. E., to permit installation of "shuffleboard" games in the city was approved by the council. Dubois explained in a letter that the games are not coin operated and are not for gambling purposes. He likened them to ping pong tables in describing the class of people to whom they will appeal.

City Manager Deane Seeger was given the council's permission to attend the annual convention of the International City Managers Assn. to be held Sept. 12-15 at Mackinac Island, Mich.

A sidewalk and a street improvement project were approved in turn at the council meeting after presentation of petitions from property owners who will bear the costs of the developments. The council adopted plans and specifications for the paving of 23rd Ave. from Lawrence to Washington and for a sidewalk construction on 24th Ave. between Hilyard and Alder.
