

JC Schools to Open Sept. 20

JUNCTION CITY — School opens here Sept. 20, for both the high school and grade school, according to announcement from Warner Empey, high school principal, and Mrs. Gertrude Sanders, clerk of District 69. As yet no person has been selected as grade school principal replacing Empey, who is the new high school principal.

A "legal snag" has developed in the \$250,000 bond issue for a new grade school, which voters approved last Thursday.

Trouble is in the recent consolidation election at Lancaster. Assorted failure of the district board to canvass the district properly, and the casting of ten votes by persons alleged not to be legal voters, are the grounds upon which objectors base their claim. The matter has been referred to the state attorney general and the school plan is held in abeyance until his ruling is received.
