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'Anti-Democratic' Methods Charged

JOHNSTON, R. I., (AP) — Democratic national chairman J. Howard McGrath believes radio commentators and the press are waging an "anti-Democratic" campaign against President Truman.

The Rhode Island senator told a party outing Sunday that "in months that have recently passed you have found a campaign in your papers and on the part of radio commentators to pour into your ears the most anti-Democratic philosophy."

"These \$100,000-a-year commentators would not be allowed to exist under a truly democratic form of government," he said. "They make your president out to be an erroneous fellow and a stupid man."

"If there ever was a man in the White House who stood up against the onslaught of press and radio influence, that man is your president Harry S. Truman."

Harvest Labor Need Reported

SALEM, — (AP) — About 1000 bean pickers are needed in the Eugene, Albany and Lebanon areas this week, but the peak farm labor demand will come in two weeks when harvesting of hops, beans, pears and prunes begins under full-scale operation, the State Employment Service said Monday.

Thousands of hop pickers will be needed in the Grants Pass area about Aug. 23, and in Eugene and Salem a week or 10 days later, the service said. Early hops are being harvested now.

The service said that 500 prune pickers will be needed for two weeks starting Aug. 24 in the Freewater district while 1000 pear pickers are being sought for the Medford area to start the harvest about Aug. 20. Hood River orchardists will need 300 pear pickers about Aug. 20, the report said.

September's farm labor needs will include not only hop and bean pickers but also workers to help harvest peaches, prunes, mint and beets.

Nuts and other land products will be harvested in October.
