Woman Must Control Dog

SPRINGFIELD — A little black and white dog that wasn't there stole the show Monday morning in the Springfield municipal court.
 Rather than dispose of the dog, the owner, Mrs. Helen Wilson, 160 W. M St., accepted a permanent \$100 suspended fine, that will be levied against her if the dog ever molests anyone on the streets of Springfield.
 The dog was placed in the city pound Aug. 8 following a complaint from Miss Dorothy Melay, 510 W. M St., that he had torn her dress.

Previously he had drawn a complaint from Mrs. Betty Kizer, 1696 Prescott Lane, on the same score.
 Court decision found Mrs. Wilson guilty of possession of a vicious animal, and she was ordered to keep him chained. Mrs. Wilson said she felt the dog meant too much to her children to allow his disposal.

Speed, Death Often Brothers

Drivers who think summer road and weather conditions make it safe to speed up are working on a theory not borne out by the facts, Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry warns.
 "Summer driving is less hazardous than winter driving, of course," Newbry said. "But what motorists tend to forget is the increased chance of death in any accident, due to higher speeds and heavier traffic."
 The secretary blames much of the state's recent large death toll on high speeds induced by good roads and weather. In a survey of accident figures, he points out that the chance of death in any accident is more than twice as great in clear weather and in rain. Similarly, the chance for death is greater on a dry highway than on wet, snowy, or icy roads.
 "A moment's thought will show that this apparently unusual experience is due to slower driving speeds under the adverse conditions," Newbry declared. "The chance for death drops as speed drops. If we gave heavy traffic the same consideration as a driving hazard we give to rain or snow, our summer fatality rate would be cut in half."

High School To 'Burn Up'

SPRINGFIELD — The Union High School is scheduled to burn down Monday night.
 Fire Chief Harry Melson expects his volunteer crew to make record time in their run on an official "false alarm" phoned in by the chief from the school grounds.
 Twice a month volunteer crews fall out for the department practice runs. Team captains Rex McCready and Walt Gossler with their public-spirited cohorts will roll out of the station, make the dash to the schoolgrounds, couple their hoses and get ready to shout, "Let 'er go."
 That's as far as the dry runs go, says Chief Melson, but "they mean a lot if we happened to have trouble in any of the areas or buildings we use for practice. The fact that the men know the ground might mean a building saved."
 Two drills a month are scheduled. Running from 7:30 until 9:30 p.m., the practice is followed by a one-hour critique by Melson.

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Anthropologist's Advice Kept Emperor On Throne

LONDON — (U.P.) — Emperor Hirohito of Japan was kept on his throne after the war on advice given to the great powers by a British anthropologist, according to Dr. Nina Ridenour of New York.
 Dr. Ridenour is executive officer of the International Committee for Mental Hygiene. In an interview she commented on a report The report was drawn up by 24 social scientists from 10 countries. They worked for 16 days in the

isolation of a hideaway near Hoxham, Sussex.
Farm Houses Unsafe Institute Reports
 NEW YORK — (U.P.) — Farm people, like their city neighbors, are injured within the home more than any place else, according to J. H. Oppenheim, president of the Farm Equipment Institute.
 Endorsing National Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, Oppenheim said 4300 farm workers were killed and 300,000 injured during 1947, representing 200 fewer deaths and 20,000 fewer injuries than in the previous year.

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
