

Housewives Vote to Press Meat Boycott Indefinitely

to continue the meat boycott indefinitely, more than 50 housewives met Monday afternoon to report progress of their first report against meat prices. The women voted down a motion to buy only 60-cent beef, and one to buy meat once a week. On a unanimous vote they declared their intention to keep up their use of meat substitutes until prices come down.

Walter F. (Vera) Hansen of Springfield, who had once been the "typical Customer" of the Los Angeles area, spoke on the business from the pasture the pressure cooker.

"I find it strange," said she, "did I find a person making a profit out of the meat business? They all sing the same tune. She observed that consumers in this area pay about 10 cents for grass-fed beef and 15 cents for grain-fed steer. Thousands of miles from the ranges. "Somebody is making money."

Hansen pointed out that in Eugene is meat inspection by law. Elsewhere in the

county, butchers comply with health inspections if they want to. There is no standard grading system in the county, yet prices here are as high as elsewhere, Mrs. Hansen said.

"Everybody seems to think we all have a little extra money these days . . . and each businessman wants to get it before another one does," Mrs. Hansen said. "Have we?" And there was a chorus of no's.

Eyes Open
The Housewives Assn., after voting to continue the "eat no meat" campaign, discussed ways of enforcing the boycott. Mrs. George Nock, (phone 5134-R) was appointed as a message center for housewives to report any "weak spots" in the campaign should meat hunger get too strong for some of the consumers.

Meals were prepared by Scouts leaders, and boats and canoes were available for instruction.

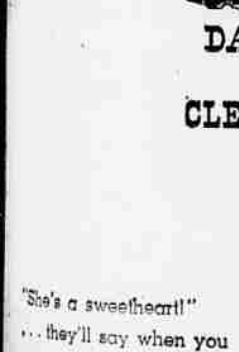
Field Executive Dave Putnam was leader of the camp.
