How many acres of Lane County beans might go unpicked in time for market if more harvest hands did not turn out to help in the fields was anybody's guess Friday morning.
 "We were still 200 pickers short. If we don't have some help we stand to waste a good portion of the crop," said Joe Grannan, farm labor representative.
 Many a Eugene businessman reported Friday his children were turning out to help. A sharp crop loss would mean a cut in Lane County purchasing power and its effect would spread to most businesses in town, they thought.
 Volunteer workers can go to work when they report in to the OSES at 8:45 a.m. opposite the city hall in Eugene.
 Pickers are drawing up to \$12 a day.

Registration Rules Outlined

Persons who will become of age or who will have completed the required six months residence in Oregon after the registration books close Oct. 2, but before election day Nov. 2, will be permitted to register during September, the county clerk's office reported Friday.
 In order to vote in the November elections, it is necessary to register before Oct. 2. Persons previously registered who have not moved, changed parties, or failed to vote at least once in two years, need not re-register, Deputy Clerk Mel Wadman explained.
 Those who have changed their voting status, or have failed to vote in the last two years, must be registered again, in order to have their names appear properly on the precinct polling books.
 Registration for persons not yet 21 or not having completed six months residence, but who will be qualified between Oct. 2 and Nov. 2, will begin Sept. 8 and continue until the books are closed.
 Other qualified voters may register during business hours daily at the courthouse.
 Wadman pointed out that many persons coming to Oregon from state having longer residence requirements, may register and vote here in November if they arrived in Oregon before May 2, 1948.

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Postoffice Mail Runs Bids Date Set

Sealed bids for carrying the United States mails between the post office and bus and train depots will be received at Eugene Postoffice until 4 p.m. Monday, Aug. 30.
 The mails must be transported between the postoffice and the Southern Pacific depot, and also to the Greyhound bus depot. Bidders must not be under 18 years of age and suitable to be entrusted with the care and custody of the mails. The successful bidder must provide suitable equipment for transporting the mails, and will be required to transport mail to and from each train or bus carrying mails.
 Information and proposal forms are available at the postmaster's office. All bids must be on an annual basis.

Fred Ossian Small

Fred Ossian Small, 81, Albany, died in Albany Wednesday. He was born Jan. 13, 1867 in Madrid, Maine, and was graduated from Farmington Normal School at Farmington, Me. in 1889 and from Bowdoin College in Brunswick, Me. in 1895. In 1905 he completed law school at Harvard. He married Margaret F. Knowles July 12, 1898 in Winchendon, Mass., and taught and was principal in an endowed high school in that city. He was also principal of Washington Academy in East Machias, Me. He lived in Klamath Falls for 19 years and Albany the past four months.
 Surviving are his widow; a daughter, Mrs. Clarence Hines, Eugene; two brothers, Guy O., of Kennebunkport, Me., and Burton Small, Farmington, Me.

Kramer Will Judge State Fair Horse Show

GI Insurance Premiums Due

Northwest veterans who reinstated their GI insurance just before the July 31 "easy reinstatement" deadline should pay another monthly premium to the Veterans Administration immediately to prevent the policy lapsing again.
 The VA said Friday most veterans who reinstated their national service life insurance last month paid only the required two-months' premium. Under GI insurance regulations, one premium covered the 30-day grace period before the policy lapsed and the other the month of reinstatement.
 Therefore, veterans who reinstated to beat the July 31 deadline paid only for July insurance protection, with another payment due sometime in August according to the due date of their policy.
 GI insurance premiums may be paid monthly, quarterly, semi-annually or annually. Advance payments, other than monthly, are discounted by the VA and result in even greater economy to the GI policy holder.

Albany Schedules Centennial Fete

The city of Albany will celebrate the 100th anniversary of Oregon Territorial government with a horse show and historical pageant next Wednesday, Aug. 25.
 The horse show will feature Sharik's Sun, a four-year-old half-Arabian Golden Palomino stallion sired by the nationally known stallion, Sharik. The show is slated for 8 p.m. at Hudson Field in Albany.
 The historical pageant is written and produced by Albany residents to portray early Oregon history and the spirit of the pioneers.
