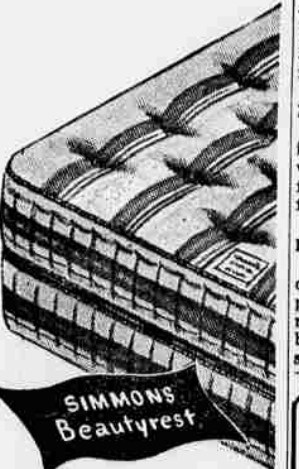

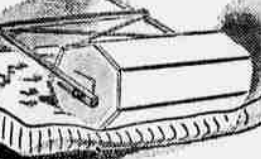

annexation petitions, the councilmen will have before them a report of their finance committee hall sinking fund for construction recommending the use of the city of a new jail.

This fund has been acquired through a special levy approved by the voters on May 19, 1944. It now stands at \$57,834, and the special one-mill levy will be assessed again this year before the voters' five-year authorization expires.

In order to use the fund for jail building, the city attorney has informed the council, the jail would need to be part of an overall city hall plan and located on the site of the intended municipal building.

The finance committee, favoring a detached jail, is reporting a plan whereby the voters would be asked in November specifically to authorize the divorcing of the main city hall and the police station.

Monday night's meeting will be the last at which the council will be able to consider additional ballot propositions. The law requires action by the council 60 days before the election.

co-belligerent nation since Sept. 16, 1940. (Under this, if you qualify, you fill in the branch of service, your service or serial number, date of entry, name of last organization, date of separation.)

15. Present membership in a reserve complement of the armed forces (and you list the branch of service, service or serial number, date of entry, grade and organization.)

16. Color of eyes, color of hair, complexion, height, weight, race, other obvious physical characteristics that will aid in identification. Then you sign it, and the registrar for your local board will sign it and put in the date, county, city and state.

After registering, draft-age men will wait for classification forms which should be received within a week or two. These are much more detailed, and must be returned within 10 days.

A man's classification is determined by local boards from these two forms.

World Churches Meet Today in Amsterdam

AMSTERDAM — (U.P.) — The first International Assembly of the World Council of Churches will meet here Sunday as a "visible, tangible and practical demonstration to the world that the church can hold itself together."

Representatives of 150 Protestant and orthodox churches from 42 nations will gather in Amsterdam's Nieuwekerk (New Church) as church bells throughout the Netherlands ring for 15 minutes to mark the historic occasion.

Dr. Henry S. Lelander of New York, general secretary of the council, said the assembly's outstanding importance is "an expression of the sense of world community which we need unless the world is to become chaos leading finally and necessarily to self-destruction."

Mobile Unit X-Ray Program Scheduled to Start in County

Residents of Lane County east of the coast range will be able to have free X-rays taken during the mobile unit, Mrs. John A. Smith, president, in charge of appointments.

Sponsored by the Oregon Tuberculosis and Health Ass'n, the Oregon State Board of Health, the Lane County Health Department and the Lane tuberculosis agency, the mobile unit will be at the following locations from Sept. 1 to 17:

Sept. 1 and 2: Half-day stands at several centrally located mills in the Seneca district for mill workers of the district.

Sept. 3: At Lane health department in courthouse from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. for food handlers, beauty operators and teachers. A limited number of other applications will be accepted from persons calling 4915 or 4181. The complete program for Eugene will be Oct. 7, 8 and 9 with the larger portable unit scheduled for use. These X-rays will be made at the Lane County Tuberculosis and Health Association Office, 860 Willamette St.

Sept. 7: Associated Plywood Mills, 9 a. m. to 2 p. m. Glustina Mills, 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Employees of smaller mills in the areas may use the equipment at this time.

Sept. 8: Veneta at Victory Village housing project, 11 a. m. to 7 p. m. This is sponsored by the Elmira High School PTA, with Mrs. Elmer Briles, president. 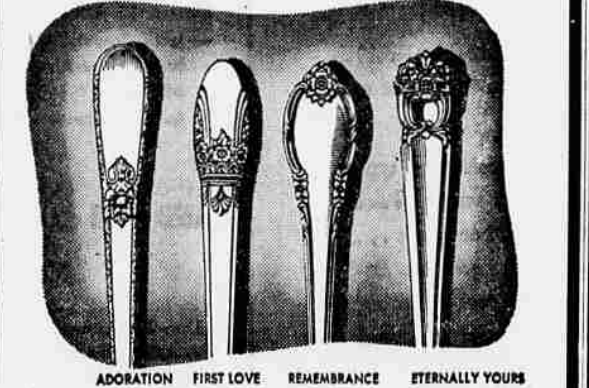
