Meatless Menus

In cooperation with Lane County Housewives' Association, the following meatless meals have been planned by Sister Christina, head dietitian, Sacred Heart Hospital.

TUESDAY

Breakfast: Grapefruit segments, cooked or prepared cereal, poached eggs, buttered toast, drink.

Luncheon: Scalloped oysters, lyonnaise potatoes, corn on the cob, sherbert, brown or white bread, drink.

Dinner: Cheese souffle, shoe-string potatoes, spinach, orange and avocado salad, frozen berries, cookies, bread, drink.

WEDNESDAY

Breakfast: Orange juice, cereal, poached eggs, buttered toast, and drink.

Luncheon: Cream of tomato soup, Spanish noodles, tossed vegetable salad, buttered squash, fresh peaches, bread and drink.

Dinner: Stuffed baked potato with cheese and crab or tuna, cooked celery, molded beet salad with stuffed eggs, date nut cream, brown bread and drink.

Recipe

Braise your duckling for a change instead of roasting it. Have your meat dealer cut the duck in quarters or smaller servings. Prepare the duck for cooking. Place skin side down in Dutch oven or large frying pan. Cook, uncovered, over moderate heat for 45 minutes, pouring off accumulated fat. Continue to cook, covered, for another 30 minutes, or until duck is tender and nicely browned, turning occasionally. Serve with giblet gravy or a special sauce. To finish cooking the duck in a sauce, braise uncovered for 45 minutes as directed. Drain off the accumulated fat. Then add your sauce and continue to cook, covered, for 30 minutes over low heat or in slow oven (325 degrees F.).

Braised Duck in Black Cherry Sauce

(Serves 4)

Five to 6-pound duckling, 1 tablespoon duck fat, 1 tablespoon minced onion, 1 1/2 cups duck broth, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 bay leaf, 1/2 teaspoon marjoram, 1 No. 2 can black cherries, 2 tablespoons cornstarch.

Have meat dealer cut duck in quarters. Braise duck according to directions. Meanwhile cook giblets. Drain off liquid. Allow fat to rise to top and pour it off. Place 1 tablespoon fat in saucepan. Add onion. Cook over low heat about 3 minutes. Add 1 1/2 cups duck broth, salt, bay leaf and marjoram. Drain cherries. Combine 1/2 cup cherry juice and cornstarch. Stir into hot broth. Cook, stirring constantly, until sauce thickens and boils. Remove bay leaf. Add cherries and heat thoroughly. Serve hot over braised duck quarters. If desired, substitute 1/2 cup red wine for 1/2 cup broth.

Fat from duck roasted at low temperature or braised over moderate heat gives an extra-special flavor to panned vegetables, pan-fried meats or highly seasoned sauces.

Picnic Lima Beans

(Serves 6)

One and one-half cups dried lima beans, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 quart water, 8 bacon slices, 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 1 cup diced onion, 1 clove garlic, minced, 1 1/2 cups canned tomatoes, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 teaspoons chili powder.

Soak lima beans overnight. Add beans and two teaspoons salt to one quart water and cook beans until tender. Drain. Pour beans into well-greased large yellow dish of heat-resistant glass refrigerator-oven set. Cook bacon slices until done but not crisp. Drain bacon. Brown green pepper, onion and garlic in bacon fat. Cut four slices cooked bacon into small pieces. Add to browned mixture with tomatoes, two teaspoons salt, pepper and chili powder. Cook five minutes. Pour tomato mixture over lima beans. Arrange remaining four slices of bacon on top of beans. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 25 minutes.

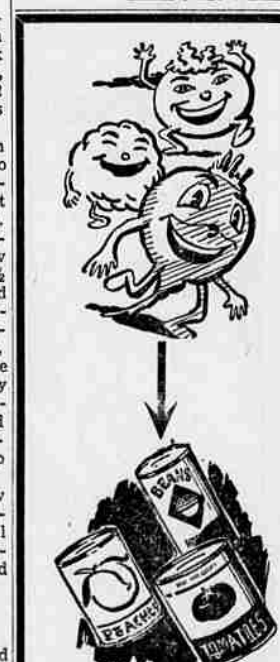
Initiated into Women's Relief Corps Thursday evening were Mrs. John Starr and Mrs. Mabel Hansen. Thirty-three were present.

Walter, nursing a pair of bruised feet, said he knew where he was all the time.

"I knew where the mountain was, so I just walked up it," he said. Meanwhile, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Schramm of Portland, reported Walter had wandered away from a huckleberry picking party. A posse of 90 forest rangers, sheriff's deputies and volunteers immediately spread out in a search.

Six hours later, the barefoot boy walked alone into the lodge.
