

State Air Board Plans Visit To Examine Eugene's Fields

The future of Eugene's aviation industry will be given inside-out examination Sept. 9 when the entire State Board of Aeronautics will be entertained at a luncheon and taken on an inspection of the two municipal airports.

At the recommendation of the City Aviation Commission and the Chamber of Commerce aviation committee, a master plan is to be prepared for the development of the two Eugene flying fields.

Advice on this plan, an essential preliminary to any local effort to obtain federal grant-in-aid funds, will be obtained from the board.

Members of the board will arrive at the Eugene Airpark in two planes and will be met by the local aviation groups and city officials. Also to be invited to the

following luncheon meeting are representatives of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, Lane County legislators and county officials.

Members of the State Board of Aeronautics are: B. F. Ruffner, Corvallis, chairman; Lee U. Eyerly, Salem; E. S. Maroney, Portland; Dr. William M. Pearce, La Grande; and J. R. Roberts, Redmond. W. M. Bartlett, the agency's administrative director, will visit Eugene with the board.

Veteran OSC Editor Dies in Corvallis

CORVALLIS—(P)—Dr. Edwin T. Reed, 75, editor of publications at Oregon State College for 35 years, died Wednesday. He suffered a heart attack.

He was author of a Oregon State College history, "The First 80 Years" and of numerous books of prose and verse. He composed the OSC creed recited each year by freshmen entrants at the school.

His widow, two daughters and a son survive.

Group Opposes 'Another Vanport'

PORTLAND, Ore.—(U.P.)—The newly-formed Housing Advisory committee of the Portland Housing Authority Thursday was on record against any move toward "another Vanport."

The committee, at its organization meeting here Wednesday, adopted a resolution introduced by Marshall Dana of the Oregon Journal, placing it on record against "concentration camp" projects like Vanport and in favor of small single-family residences "if it is at all possible."

Vanport, war-born housing city north of Portland, was destroyed in the Memorial Day Columbia River flood disaster, greatly increasing an already serious housing problem here.

The committee voted to establish its own official housing authority and set itself a deadline of one week to get up complete information on money and land that will be available and applicable for FHA mortgage insurance. The group represents some 30 Portland civic and public organizations.

British to Test U S Film Boycott

LONDON — (U.P.)—Six top films have been earmarked for export to the United States to test the reported boycott of British films in America, the British film industry disclosed Thursday.

One of the films is J. Arthur Rank's latest production, "Oliver Twist," which has been banned by one American critic for allegedly portraying the villainous Fagin as a Jew.

The other films are: "The Red Shoes," a film ballet in color; "Scott of the Antarctic," which has not been seen here yet; "Saraband for Dead Lovers," yet to be released in the United Kingdom; "Dulcimer Street," which was released here as "London Belongs to Me"; and a color film of the Olympics.

The threat to boycott "Oliver Twist" surprised both the British film industry and public. It has been a sellout here for weeks without any criticism from British Jews.

Toledo Mill Strike Nears Settlement

TOLEDO, Ore.—(P)—Settlement of a week-old strike of AFL sawmill workers at the C. D. Johnson Lumber Mill here appeared hopeful Wednesday after a 10-hour meeting of mill and union representatives.

Ray Boone, agent for Local No. 2720, said a tentative agreement was reached on all points by the negotiators. The proposal will go to the members called into session Saturday. Some 600 employees are involved in the work stoppage.

Officials Ponder Liquor Initiative

OLYMPIA—(U.P.)—State Elections Supervisor Ken Gilbert was questioned at length Wednesday on his department's checking of signatures for Initiative 167 during the second day of hearings brought by backers of the liquor measure. The liquor reform committee, sponsor of the liquor-by-the-drink measure, has charged Gilbert and his staff with faulty checking of names on petitions. The committee charged that backers of Initiative 171, the other liquor bill, influenced name checkers so they were unable to perform their duties competently. Gilbert testified that 36,712 of the 82,107 submitted signatures were invalid. He denied that the

measure was discriminated against. A total of 50,000 valid signatures are needed to place the measure on the ballot.

Gilbert said a complete recheck of rejected signatures was made after it was found that a number of signatures had been wrongly rejected. He said the second check was sufficiently accurate to ascertain that not enough signatures were valid.
