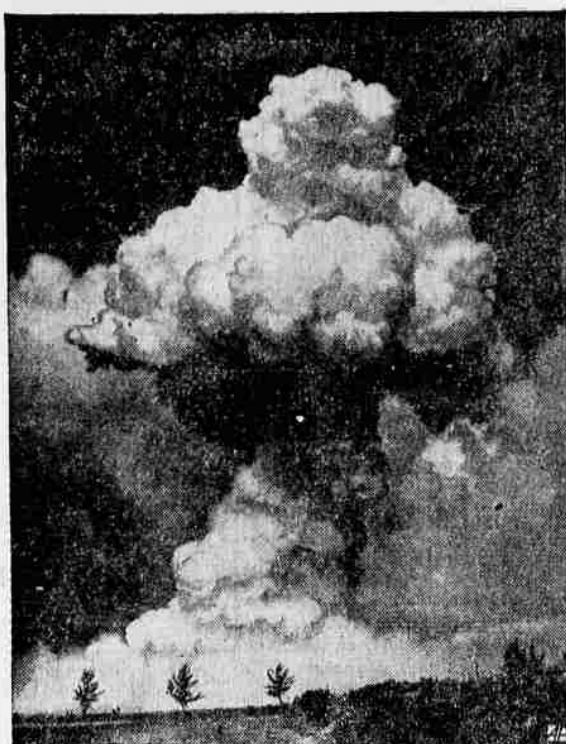

U S Troops Called

Bar to Communism

SAN FRANCISCO —(UP)—Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, retiring commander of America's occupation army in Japan, warned Wednesday that there is "danger" of Communism spreading among the Japanese if U. S. troops are sent home.

"Trouble might develop if we were to leave Japan," Eichelberger said. "Without any military forces, the Japanese have no way to protect themselves."

Eichelberger, 62-year-old hero of the Pacific War, came home to a warm welcome as he docked here from Yokohama on his way to retirement, ending a brilliant 43-year military career.

Guns fired a salute and military bands played in a brief pier-side ceremony as the U. S. Army Transport Simon B. Buckner was warped into the Fort Mason dock by tugs. With Eichelberger was his wife and his ex-chief of staff, Maj. Gen. James A. Lester, who assumed command of the San Francisco Port of Embarkation in a colorful ceremony shortly after his arrival.

Fred R. Price

Fred R. Price, 74, died at his home here Wednesday. He was born in Junction City Aug. 7, 1874, and in early life lived in Farmington, Wash. He married Lela M. Harris Dec. 3, 1899. He had been a resident of Eugene for the past 36 years. He was preceded in death by a son, Clifford.

Surviving are his widow; a daughter, Gladys Ashworth of Eugene; a sister, Mrs. T. J. Leuty of Spokane, Wash.; a brother, Frank Price of Eugene; two grandchildren; an aunt and numerous nieces and nephews including Paul E. and Frank B. Price of Eugene.

Funeral services will be Friday at 10:30 a. m. at the Poole-Larsen Chapel. Rev. David Seaman will officiate with interment at Westlawn Memorial Cemetery.
