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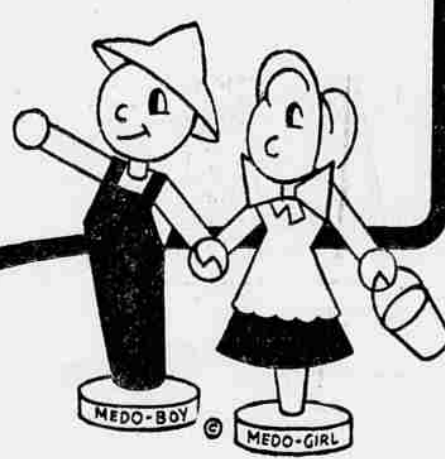
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Supreme Court Justice Fined on Traffic Count

Local Farm Youths Win Judging Honors

2500 Maintenance Men To Leave for England

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Air Force said Wednesday 2500 maintenance men will leave for England Sept. 1 to take care of American B-29 airplanes there and the transport ships in the Berlin airlift.

The headquarters for the group will be at a wartime maintenance depot at Burtonwood, Lancashire.

The men leaving will be from the U. S. Air Force 59th Air Depot, now stationed at Griffis Air Force Base, Rome, N. Y. and from the Weather and Communications Service of the Military Air Transport Service (MATS).

First Tuna Caught In North Pacific

ASTORIA — (AP) — Tuna have been taken off the Alaskan Coast, believed the first such catch in the North Pacific.

The New England Fish Company reported five boats had landed Alaskan tuna at its Ketikan plant. The fish were taken north of the Queen Charlotte and Graham Islands.

Again Your 'Neighbors' Will Send 'Greetings'

WASHINGTON — (UP) — The 1948 peacetime draftee, like his wartime counterpart, will be "greeted" by the President when his "neighbors" decide he should be called up for Army service this year. Selective Service disclosed Wednesday.

A spokesman said that the greeting cards familiar to World War II draftees will again be in evidence when the Army decides early in September how many men, 19 through 25 years of age, it wants Selective Service to induct.

Five days from now the first segment of an estimated 9,600,000 American men will begin to register for the draft. From their ranks probably will be called 250,000 to bring the Army up to its appropriated strength of 790,000.
