### Amsterdam Scene of World Council

## 40 Nations Represented In United Church Meeting

AMSTERDAM —(NEA)— A "United Nations" of the church world is assembling here to write an historic chapter in the Christian communion of the world. Leading dignitaries of Protestant and Eastern Orthodox churches of the world will take part in the first assembly of the World Council of Churches, which is in session in this city from August 22 to September 4.

Representation of delegates includes 150 religious bodies in 40 countries. It is the first demonstration of a world-wide universal church movement and is expected to bridge the traditional gulf between the churches of the Protestant and Orthodox faiths. More than 1400 persons are expected to attend the assembly which will formally constitute the World Council after 10 years as a provisional body.

The convalescence will include 450 official delegates; 360 alternate delegates; 100 youth delegates; 500 fraternal delegates, accredited visitors, observers, consultants, press and radio representatives. The Roman Catholic Church, which is the only one of the major Christian bodies unrepresented, is expected to have unofficial observers present.

Churches in countries on both sides of the so-called "iron curtain" and from victor and defeated nations alike in World War II will send delegates. Church bodies from the following countries will participate in the deliberations:

- Australia, Austria, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, China, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Egypt, Ethiopia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Holland, Hungary, India, Indonesia, Italy, Japan, Korea, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Palestine, Philippine Islands, Poland, Romania, Siam, South

He has been honored with the degree of doctor of divinity by three colleges and the degree L.L.D. by Dennison University of Ohio, Berkeley Baptist Divinity School, Berkeley, Calif. Dr. Brougher was elected to the office of president of Northern Baptist Convention 15 years ago. He was a close friend of the late Will Rogers, and has been called "The Will Rogers of the American Baptist."
