HERE ARE A FEW TIPS ON CANNING AT COX'S CUSTOM CANNING!

BEANS

Beans may be broken, snipped, and covered with a cold damp cloth at home and then brought to the cannery. Bring: Tea towel, pan and the beans. Blanch and put in the cans at the cannery.

CORN

Bring: Tea towel, sharp knife and corn ready to blanch. We have a corn cutting machine that will save hours of work. (Corn should be blanched at the cannery, never at home.)

TOMATOES

Bring: Tea towel, tomatoes, knife and pans.

TOMATO JUICE

Same as tomatoes except tomatoes are cut and run through a pureeing machine at the cannery which removes skin, seeds and pulp.

APPLE SAUCE

Bring: Tea towel, knife, sugar, spice (if desired), small kettle for dipper, and 2 or 3 large pans. Prepare apples at the cannery. Put through cooker, puree machine and then canneo.

SCRAMBLED EGGS ON TOAST FOR DINNER

Probably more eggs are cooked by this method than by any other for it is the easiest yet some people serve them poorly at that. It is unfortunate that such a delicate dish as scrambled eggs should be placed in the category of bad food when with only a little attention, anyone can make a sunshiny delectable dish. To make them in this manner follow:

Plenty of butter or substitute in frying pan

Use 2 eggs per person

Use 3 tablespoons cream per person.

Beat eggs and cream until light; add salt and pepper and pour into hot butter in pan; reduce heat a medium; cook, stirring gently just until eggs are set; serve piping hot on butter toast and garnish with minced parsley.
