Candidates C. A. (Tom) Swarts for sheriff, and Phil Bartholomew for coroner drew the mirthful applause of the delegates when they observed that they were not only unopposed Republican candidates, but had both received enough write-in votes in the primary to make them Democrats as well.

Harry Chase, who will run against Alex McKinney for county clerk, and Earl Hill, candidate for state representative, also took their bows during the later part of the meeting.

house, between 1931 and 1936, was the scene of the Scottsboro rape trials.

Bringing his campaign into the deep South, Wallace faced an icy reception from municipal officials. One Alabama mayor even wrote him, "your presence is not desired here."

Other city officials warned him they would strictly enforce segregation laws. Mississippi and Arkansas refused to permit the former vice-president to speak from the steps of their state capitols.

Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Arkansas all promised state highway patrol escorts, although Gov. James E. Folsom of Alabama said he didn't "believe anyone in Alabama will physically harm Mr. Wallace."

3 Million Given Oregon for Roads

WASHINGTON — (AP) — State shares in the \$450,000,000 authorized by Congress for road repairs and construction during the year beginning July 1, 1949, were announced Tuesday by Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, federal works administrator.

The funds will be administered by the Public Roads Administration in cooperation with state highway departments. The states generally are required to match federal expenditures.

State shares in funds for primary roads included:

Oregon, \$3,330,486; Washington, \$3,145,271.

Allocations for feeder or secondary roads:

Oregon, \$2,272,391; Washington, \$2,129,819.

Allocations for urban highways:

Oregon, \$720,430; Washington, \$1,303,754.

Canada to Sell Iron Ore to Japanese

VANCOUVER, B. C. — (UP) — Arrangements for the sale of 250,000 tons of iron ore to Japan from British Columbia Wednesday was expected to be completed this week.

W. L. Leo, president of the China Mutual Trading Co., Seattle, said a large contract for iron ore had been placed with the firm by the Japanese Board of Trade. The ore would be taken from Texada Island in the Gulf of Georgia, Leo said.

New Storm Watched

MIAMI, Fla.—(AP)—A new tropical storm in the Caribbean was being watched as an Atlantic hurricane swept harmlessly to sea off Nova Scotia Wednesday. A disturbance in the Gulf of Mexico was removed as a possible threat.

A ship reported it experienced 50 to 60 mile an hour winds, but as the storm passed between Martinique and St. Lucia Tuesday night the highest winds experienced were 45 miles an hour.

Fire Destroys Big Hop Kiln

SALEM, —(AP)—A large hop dry kiln valued at \$100,000 and hops worth \$50,000 were destroyed by fire near here Tuesday night at the T. A. Livesley and Company yard.

Firemen prevented wind-fanned flames from reaching houses, a large warehouse and a baler structure while hundreds of crop workers in the area stamped out grain field spot fires caused by flying embers.

The fire broke out in the kiln about 8 o'clock and in a few minutes was out of control. Firemen from four neighboring communities fought the blaze.

The damage estimate was made by Fred E. Fralick, hop yard manager. The yard and the company's 342 acres of hops represent one of the largest and most modern hop operation in the region.
