Gulf Coast Calm After Hurricane

NEW ORLEANS — (U.P.) — The Gulf Coast was in holiday mood Monday, thankful that a hurricane had done so little harm.

New Orleans, southern Louisiana and a stretch of the Mississippi coast escaped with only minor damage when Saturday's storm blew in and broke up over land. Monday morning the situation was almost normal.

In some places communications were difficult, and water damage was extensive in low-lying areas. There were apparently no casualties.

The area from the Louisiana border to Gulfport, Miss., was the hardest hit, primarily by water which went over the seawall. Roads closed by the storm were re-opened Sunday and Grand Isle, where the storm-center first touched land, was found to be little damaged.

By Sunday night the 5000 persons given temporary refuge here had returned to their homes, some of which were still surrounded by flood waters. No full estimate of damage was available, but Red Cross officials said it was much less than had been expected.

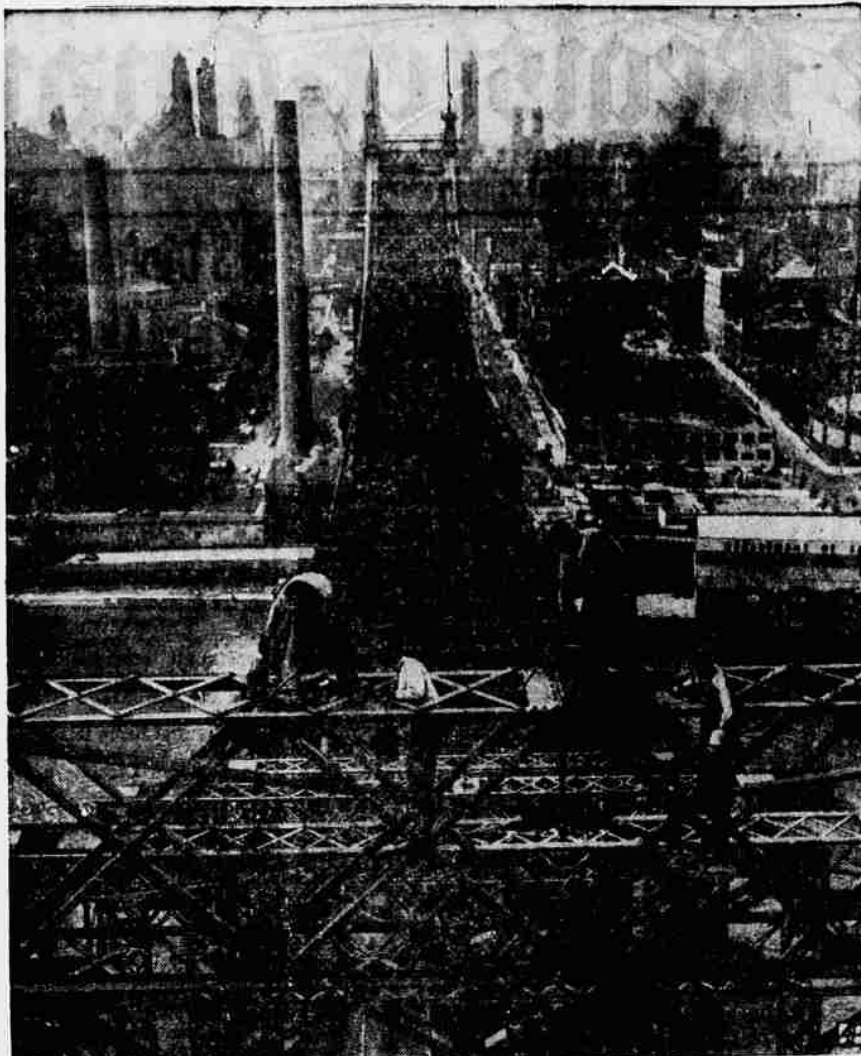
French Workers Get New Grant

PARIS — (U.P.) — Premier Robert Schuman moved swiftly Monday to solidify the position of his new French government by concessions to workers suffering from inflation and high prices.

Returning to power after the gravest crisis since liberation, Schuman started at once to make good on his promise to the Socialists that some aid would be given labor. His cabinet, little changed from that which had ruled France for 10 months, decided at its first meeting last night to give an immediate bonus of 2500 francs—about \$8—to each worker in private industry.

The bonus will be given no later than Saturday, it was announced. Other steps to aid workers and thus halt the wave of strikes which swept the nation during the eight-day cabinet crisis were believed in prospect. Schuman announced early Sunday that he finally had been able to obtain sufficient support of another "third force" or middle-of-the-road coalition cabinet, excluding both the extreme left, the communists, and the extreme right, Gen. Charles de Gaulle's powerful Rally of the French People.

ECA Bill for Week Nears All-Time High

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The Economic Cooperation Administration disclosed Monday it authorized \$134,057,763 to help recovery programs in Europe and China during the week ending last Wednesday.

It was the second largest weekly authorization since ECA started in business in April, being topped only by the authorizations of \$215,071,075 for the week ending June 16.

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Poland Hears Echo of Tito

WARSAW — (U.P.) — The Polish Communist Workers Party Monday embarked on a purge of nationalist members and called for a "class war" in farm villages throughout the nation.

Party members and organizers from all Poland assembled in Warsaw at the summons of President Boleslaw Beirut for a council of war on a party split which endangers the Communist grip on Poland.

The party members were told in a public communique of the party executive committee that there must be a "full liquidation" of all members who fail to follow the Marxist-Leninist line as handed down by Moscow.

The communique also made it clear that the Communists intended to push through socialization by production in peasant villages, one of the issues which caused the party split. The party organizers got orders to sell the socialization plan to the peasants.

(The Polish press agency in London quoted an official spokesman in Warsaw as announcing "no changes are expected" in the Polish government.)

UMMMM MEAT!
Lyons Weekly News Service, Sept. 6—"Ahhh," said Jack, the meat man at know nuthin' about a local market. "I don't price of meat, just what I heard!" And what he heard seems to be plenty. The government says the price of meat will drop some time in October. The United States Meat Institute predicts the falling price of meat next year. And a very reliable meat salesman from a large meat-packing house says the price of meat will drop in November! At any rate, no one predicts that meat prices will rise, which is good news in itself! For the first time in many months, various cuts of meat are available. Different cuts mean different prices!

ELBERTA PEACHES HAVE ARRIVED
Elberta peaches are an excellent freezing variety, not as good as SLAPPY, but nevertheless Elbertas will be mighty tasty on a cold winter night! Naturally the price of Elberta peaches are lower than Slappy. Halve and pit the peaches, then dip in boiling water for 1/2-minute. Then slice the peaches in a light brine, one tablespoon of salt to one quart of water. To prevent discoloration, either dip the peaches into boiling water one minute, or add ascorbic acid to the syrup in proportion of 1/4-teaspoon to one quart of fruit. The price of Elberta peaches is not likely to go any lower!

BY GREEN BEANS
Slowly, but surely the green bean is slipping into oblivion. This is the last week to buy beans that are good in quality and low in price. Oh yes, beans will still be available after next week but the price will be higher, and the bright green will have turned to a yellowish, unhealthy shade. In other words, the quality will not be good enough to freeze. The green bean varieties to buy for freezing are: Kentucky Wonder, Tendergreen, Full Measure, Stringless Green Pod, Blue Lake and Round Pod. Use only the firmest, greenest beans for freezing. Wash and sort the beans carefully and cut to desired length, usually about 1 1/2 inches. Blanch the beans from 3 to 4 minutes, then cool quickly in ice or running water. Drain off all the water and pack in freezing containers.

COMING ATTRACTIONS
Pears will be on the market next week. The price, though, will not be low enough for freezing several weeks. Prunes will be available next week. Speaking of prunes, there is an amazing number of very good recipes to make prunes. As a rule, no one ever thinks of prunes anything but dried, shriveled, but have ever made a prune pudding, or a prune custard, or a prune whip?
