basis, was the outgrowth of studies made by Oregon lumbermen and civic groups.

Corcoran said the first draft of the act was submitted in the mid-1930's by Willamette Valley Lumbermen's Assn. He said the law at that time was supported in Congress by lumbermen; that it was opposed in Congress by the 18 O & C land grant counties.

### Boundary Objection

State Senator Orval N. Thompson, Albany, was the first witness called to the stand Tuesday. He objected to the boundaries of the Santiam master unit, and to the lines of the northern boundary of the proposed Mohawk sustained yield unit.

The state senator said the northern tip of the Mohawk unit, which extends into Linn County, is part of the Calapooya watershed, and that its inclusion in the Mohawk unit would make a ghost town of Brownsville within eight to 12 years.

### Titus Second

The second witness was R. T. Titus, Portland, head of the Western Forest Industries Assn. His testimony and objections followed the line of that given by his group last January, principally that the proposed 100-year sustained yield agreements with private operators would create monopoly and cut out the small operators who do not own enough acreage to join such a unit.

The Titus group of small and medium-sized timber operators was expected to present a new plan of forestry conservation before the ending of the hearings Friday.

## Powers Ponder Moscow Protest

setting up a separate Red government in the Soviet sector of the city.

The German Socialist press accused the Western powers of winking on their obligations here.

### Maneuvers Planned

The Russians served notice at the four power Berlin Air Safety Center that Soviet planes will hold maneuvers over the Berlin area and the Russian Zone during the week ending Sept. 14.

An American official said it is not known how extensive the maneuvers will be "but the implication is that there will be more than normal activity." Since the Russians blockaded the land approaches to Berlin in late June, the U. S. and Britain have been supplying western sectors of the city by air.

### Sell-Out Charged

The Communist press charged the anti-Communist administration with "selling out Berlin to the Western Powers." The Soviet administration's newspaper Taegliche Rundschau said efforts were being made to "make Western Berlin an advance observation post and base of the Truman front."

The paper also declared attempts were being made to "disturb the Moscow negotiations in the last moment" with "provocations."

### OFFICE MOVED

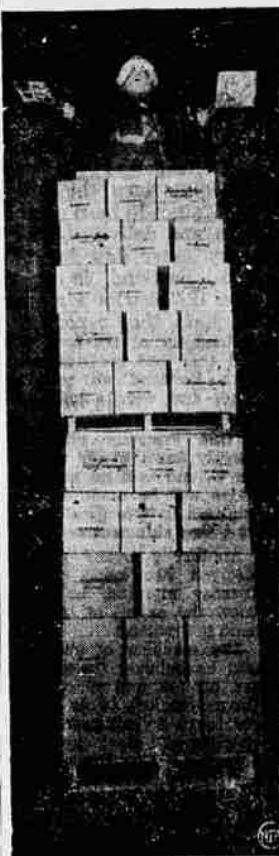
