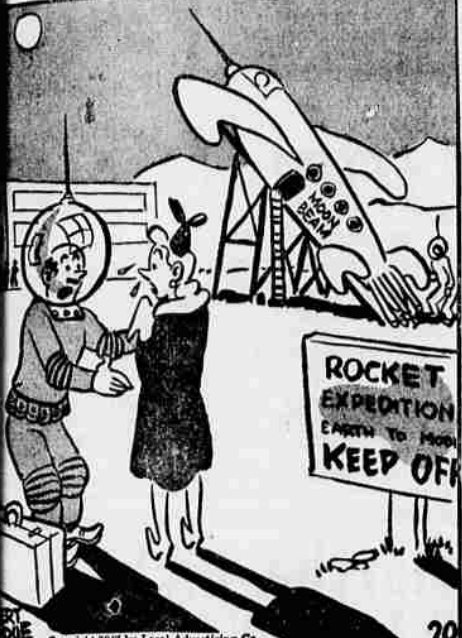

**PRUNES!**  
 Lyons Weekly News Service, Sept. 13 —  
 Last week, I believe we said that we'd talk about prunes this week. A very timely subject because they're plentiful and low in price! In most markets, you can buy a pound for just 7c. Use only Italian prunes for freezing. By the way, Italian prunes are grown in Eugene and unfortunately have no exotic connotation with Italy. Sort, wash, halve and pit the prunes. Then pack and cover the prunes with syrup. The use of ascorbic acid in the syrup is optional. The proportion is 1/4-teaspoon to each quart of fruit.

**PEARS!**  
 Contrary to popular belief, you can freeze pears. Buy only the variety, Kieffer for freezing. There's a short crop this year, they're scarce and consequently the price is slightly higher than it was last year. Peel, core, and quarter the pears. Pears may either be packed dry or with syrup! It is wise to buy pears this week, if you plan on freezing them, for they're not expected to last more than several weeks.

**PEACHES!**  
 Prunes, Pears, and Peaches... all ingredients for a delicious fruit salad, and they're available now at low prices. Seems to me, we've been talking about peaches for several weeks! The varieties to freeze haven't changed since last week, or the week before. Excuse me, Slappy peaches are now off the market. ... they're replaced by Late Crawford, Elberta and Hale peaches are still sitting pretty and pink in their wooden crates. Halve and pit, the peaches, then scald in boiling water until you can easily peel the skin. Slice the peaches into light brine, one tablespoon of salt per quart of water. Then to prevent discoloration, either boil the peach slices for one minute or add ascorbic acid to the syrup in proportion of 1/4 teaspoon to each quart of fruit. Peaches will be consistently low in price and high in quality until the fifteenth of September.

**CORN!**  
 There's nothing much new about corn. It's another item that we've been writing about for the past several weeks. And frankly it's boring to write and to read. Now if meat suddenly took a price slash, that would be something exciting. But what can you do, when corn is still available, when it's still low in price and good in quality? In fact corn is likely to be in that condition until November. Once more we write, the varieties to buy for freezing are Carmel-cross Tendermost, Golden Cross Bantam and Ioana. Use only the ears with the rich, milky, sweet juice. After husking, silking, and washing the corn, blanch from three to four minutes. Cool the corn quickly, drain well, and package in moisture-vapor proof paper.
