

**Rose Society History Told By President Pictures Shown**

A talk by Arthur R. Warren, president of the Rose Society, was a highlight of the meeting of Eugene Garden Club Friday evening in the clubhouse. Mr. Warren described in humorous fashion the acquisition of the building, which was an infirmary at the NYA buildings on Skinner Butte, previous to the war. It was given to the club and moved to its present location with much tribulation that has been a source of much pleasure and benefit to the community. He also described the relationship between the two groups, which are affiliated. Those attending looked over the work being done on the addition to the clubhouse, and talked of the enlarged shows which will be possible when it is completed.

**Molasses Apple Cottage Pudding**  
2 tablespoons butter  
2 tart apples  
6 tablespoons New Orleans molasses  
1/2 cup shortening  
2/3 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Melt butter; place in 6 greased custard cups, dividing butter equally. Pare apples; core; chop fine. Divide evenly in the cups; add 1 tablespoon molasses to each. Cream together shortening and sugar; add egg; beat well. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; add alternately with milk to creamed mixture. Add vanilla extract; mix well. Pour over apple mixture, filling cups 3/4 full. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees F., 45-50 minutes. Turn upside down on serving dish. Serve immediately with any preferred sauce, or whipped cream. Serves 6.

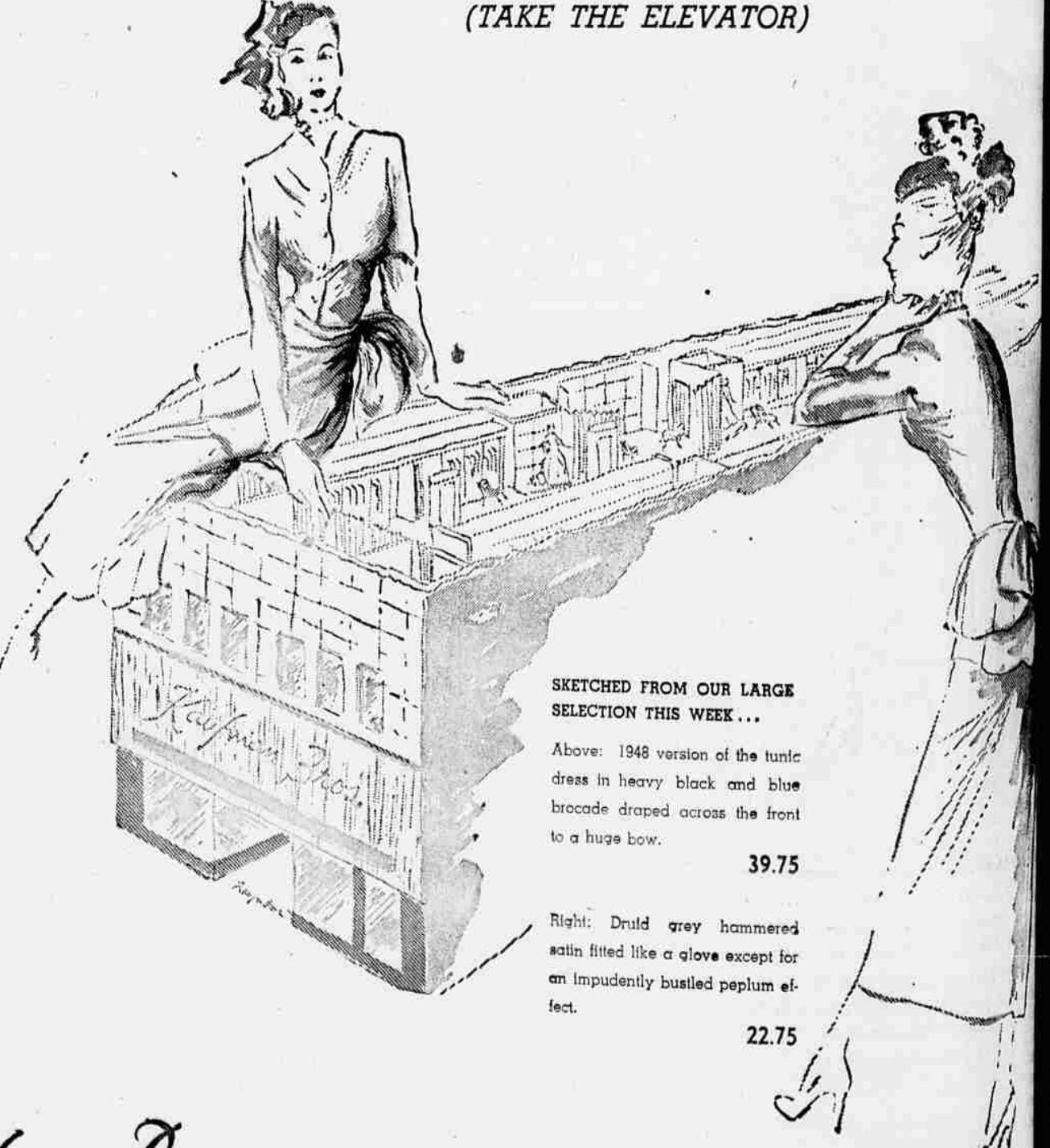
