Group to View Parking Plans

Tuesday night to discuss this plan. Code Revision.

The council adopted revisions in the standard fire prevention code prepared by the national board of fire insurance underwriters with amendments governing the use and storage of petroleum products.

Seeger explained that adoption of the new code — replacing one formulated in 1943 — is another step toward raising the city's fire insurance rating and thus lowering rates.

Final action on an ordinance to regulate and tax punchboards within the city was postponed after several councilmen objected on grounds that such action might appear to constitute a stamp of approval.

Ruling Cited

The ordinance would apply only to question-and-answer type boards. Under a state supreme court ruling in a similar case it was held the boards are not in violation of the state gambling laws. However, City Attorney John Pennington pointed out the ruling was made several years ago and the court might reverse its previous decision.

Further action on considering alternate plans for the financing of milk inspection in Eugene was taken when the council instructed Seeger to arrange a meeting with distributors. Eugene distributors now are paying, under protest, a butterfat tax to finance the inspections.

Project Lease

The council agreed to grant an annual lease directly to the University of Oregon for the operation of the Skinner's Butte housing project, after inserting a clause giving both parties the right to terminate the arrangement. Previously the lease had been granted to the university through the Federal Public Housing Agency, which is being discontinued.

The University asked a lease, renewable annually, to operate the property, offering a sum equal to the annual taxes. In 1948-49 this would amount to about \$570.

After amending the proposed lease the council authorized its execution provided the counterproposal was agreeable to the university.

Benches Approved

By a five-to-two vote the council approved an ordinance regulating and licensing the installation and maintenance of benches containing advertising at bus stops in commercial and industrial areas. An annual fee of \$2.50 per bench was established.

The dissenters were Councilmen Calvin Crumbaker and Ray Allen who maintained the action was contrary to the spirit of restrictions on signs in other city ordinances and it was inconsistent with action taken earlier in the meeting.

The earlier action was acceptance of a board of appeals decision refusing the Oregon Settlement Assn. permission to place a sign on the sidewalk for specified hours each night advertising a local radio program.

Proponents of the benches declared they primarily were for the benefit of the public and pointed out they are restricted from congested areas and from the residential districts.

TUG SINKING

SEATTLE—(AP)—An Army tug was reported in sinking condition Tuesday on a reef about 100 miles south of Ketchikan, Alaska. The Coast Guard said a ship at the scene, off the Canadian coast, messaged in mid-morning: "She is sinking now; full stern under water." All but two members of the crew were removed.

School Issue Sent to Public

the next five years, a large part of the cost will be on a pay-as-you-go basis and subsequent interest costs will be reduced.

Calculations of the taxes that will be necessary may be altered by further increases in the assessed valuation of the school district, or by deferment of bond sales until such time as the funds may actually be needed.

Board Member MacLaren pointed out Monday night that approval of the bond issue in the October election will not mean that the school board will be obligated to issue the full amount of bonds. "We will use the bonding authority only as we have to have money for the program," MacLaren said.

Gradual Reduction

As used by the board in making its decision Monday night, approximations of the tax rates that would be required under the bond-and-levy plan indicated that School District No. 4 would levy a total of about 53 mills for the 1949-50 fiscal year; thereafter the rate would be reduced gradually for the next four years, and then with expiration of the special \$250,000 levy the rate would drop sharply.

This year the school district tax is 43.6 mills. This includes approximately 8 1/2 mills for capital improvement purposes approved in special elections this year. The 35-mill remainder constitutes the operating costs of the school system.

Cost Computed

Figuring that any increases in assessed valuation, which otherwise would reduce tax costs, will be further offset by increases in operating costs, the board computed the costs of the building program (to which the 35-mill operating costs must be added) as follows:
