

Ship Strike Off

NEW YORK—(AP)—Leaders of some 12,000 Atlantic and Gulf Coast ship's officers called off a threatened strike Thursday night, several hours before the midnight deadline.

The announcement was made by federal mediator Bernard J. Foreman. He said employers' representatives and the AFL Masters, Mates and Pilots Assn. had reached agreements on wages and hiring procedure.

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Three Plead Guilty To Hunting Too Soon

Three men plead guilty and one not guilty to a charge of hunting deer in closed season this week before Judge F. Bouey, Jr., Oakland Justice of the Peace, state police reported.

Pleading guilty to the charge were Ernest R. Beers, Portland, Mac E. Carpenter, Westfir, and Fay K. Clevenger, Portland. Beers and Carpenter were fined \$200 each, and were sentenced to 30 days in jail, with sentence suspended. Their licenses, deer tags and rifles were confiscated.

Leo McMahon, Westfir, plead not guilty to the same charge, and bail was set at \$250, state police said.

Deer season opened Friday morning.

winding up with a major address at Charleston, W. Va., Friday night. He returns to the White House Saturday morning.

In his big talk at Louisville, Ky., Thursday night, Mr. Truman put in a stout plug for his Kentucky running mate, Sen. Alben W. Barkley, and then berated the Republicans and the National Association of Manufacturers for using "vicious . . . tommyrot" to wreck his anti-inflation plan.

He charged that "the reason the NAM set out to destroy price control was that, in their greed, the leaders of big business wanted to make higher profits." He accused the Republican Party of "carrying out" NAM policies in refusing to adopt his recommendations for price control.

"In 1946," he said, "the NAM set out on a well-planned and well-financed campaign to destroy price controls, and in one year the organization spent \$3,000,000 for this purpose."

He denied that business suffered under price control and rationing.

"There never was a more vicious or better organized campaign to mislead and deceive the American people," he said. "I don't think you are going to be deceived again by that tommyrot."

Patchy Bald Heads Caused By Conflicts

LONDON—(AP)—The case of a man whose baldness was cured by acquiring a house was reported Thursday in The Practitioner, a British Medical Journal.

Dr. F. F. Hellier, dermatologist, wrote that "the essential cause of alopecia areata (Patchy baldness) is psychological."

"A patient of mine revealed . . . that he was 'fed up' at living in his mother-in-law's house. No doubt there were deeper conflicts lurking in his subconscious, but the acquisition of a new house cured his depression and his alopecia."

Friday's debate with the statement that the American proposal was "only a mild step in the limitation of national sovereignty."

Reactionary Position
"Even that mild step was rejected by the minority," he said. "The world will condemn the minority (Russian) position as reactionary."

Meanwhile, a new bloc of 12 Middle-East nations, which might radically alter the voting line-up in the U.N., was reported in progress.

Foreign ministers and chief delegates to U. N. of the nations concerned have scheduled a meeting for Saturday, a well informed Greek source said a cohesive group will be established at that time.

Near Soviet
All 12 nations have shown somewhat anti-Soviet sentiments, and they all stand in the shadow of the Russian Bear. Their more immediate tie is the current situation in Palestine, where members of the Arab League have sought to prevent establishment of a Jewish state.

The member countries occupy adjoining parts of three continents: Europe, Africa, and Asia. They are Greece, Turkey, Afghanistan, Egypt, Ethiopia, Iraq, Iran, Lebanon, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Syria, and Yemen. All except Greece and Ethiopia are predominantly Moslem, and all the Arab League nations belonging to U. N. would be included.

For the first time the Oregon State Game Commission is asking hunters to report their kills to the commission by means of a self-addressed card attached to special deer tags. The tags are required for all hunters.

What was good news for the hunter was bad news for the fisherman. Trout season now remains open only in coastal streams and tributaries of the Columbia below St. Helens.

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Bridges Offers To Step Aside

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Harry Bridges, CIO longshore chief, offered Friday to step aside and let a rank and file union committee attempt to negotiate a strike settlement with West Coast shippers.

Bridges said he and other union officials would yield in favor of a rank and file committee made up of longshoremen on the picket lines to be chosen by a secret ballot.

"And I guarantee that the rank and file committee would be a lot tougher than we have been," Bridges said in a radio broadcast.

Bridges' offer came after employees asserted they would not negotiate with union officials who failed to sign the non-Communist affidavit required if a union wishes to use the National Labor Relations Board.

Railroads Ask 8 Per Cent Boost

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The railroad industry Friday asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to let them raise present freight rates eight per cent.

The ICC granted a 25 per cent advance in freight rates to both rail and water carriers early this year.

The railroad petition filed Friday said continued increases in operating costs make a further advance in freight rates necessary.

The newly requested increases, if granted, would add about \$672,500,000 to the annual freight bill paid by shippers.

While requesting a general eight per cent advance, the railroads proposed a set of maximum dollars and cents increase on certain specific commodities.

As examples, the railroad asked for a maximum increase of eight cents a 100 pounds on fresh fruits and vegetables, and five cents a hundred on lumber and sugar.

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Last Medal of Honor Winner Announced

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army Friday named the last Medal of Honor winner of World War II—a non-com killed in battling the Germans.

Staff Sergeant John W. Minick, who led his platoon through an enemy minefield near Hurtgen, Germany, on Nov. 21, 1944, and who personally killed more than a score of enemy soldiers before he fell dead, was the 292nd and last Army or Air Force recipient of the Medal of Honor.

The Army said that award completes the list of World War II. The Navy has given the medal to 137 men, including 79 Marines and one Coast Guardsman.

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
