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Howser Faces Gambling Case

SANTA CRUZ, Cal.—(U)—Attorney Gen. Fred N. Howser, whose office may come under fire from Gov. Earl Warren's crime commission at a Los Angeles meeting, suffered a setback Friday in an attempt to prosecute alleged gambling in Santa Cruz county.

A jury of eight men and four women deliberated one hour and 20 minutes Thursday before bringing back a verdict freeing William Scontriano, who was accused of making a 70-cent slot machine payoff to a Howser undercover agent.

Not Sure
The agent, Ray R. Magill, testified he was not absolutely positive Scontriano was the bartender who made the alleged payoff. Scontriano himself denied there was a payoff.

The case was prosecuted by deputy attorney general J. Francis O'Shea, who said he would confer with Howser whether to prosecute seven other men accused of similar violations. Local authorities, including district attorney June Borina, pointedly refrained from taking part in the prosecution.

Ask Guilty Verdict
In his final argument, defense attorney Stanford Smith told the jury, "If you want to put a stamp of approval on the attorney general's office, find the defendant guilty."

The raid that led to Scontriano's arrest came after the Santa Cruz slot machine and punchboard scandal, in which charges were made, but never proved, that a shakedown was attempted in Howser's name.

Other Evidence
Evidence along similar lines seized at the crime commission meeting in Los Angeles Friday. Howser said he would not attend. Meanwhile, six men, including Wiley "Buck" Cadell, a resigned Howser agent, were to be arraigned at Ukiah Friday on five felony counts of bribery, and bribery and gambling conspiracy.

If You Think Our Inflation Is Bad, Look at China's

A practical lesson on the problem of inflation in China has been put before the public in the window of a Willamette St. jewelry store where a few bills totaling two million dollars in Chinese money have been spread out.

The money was printed between 1940 and 1947, and a \$50,000 note worth \$30,000 in U.S. money when it was printed is now worth less than a dollar in U.S. money.

Sent from China recently thru bank connections, the bills are worth less in American money than the postage and correspondence it took to bring them to this country. The entire amount would be worth about \$27.50 in American money on the current exchange.

"As late as 1940 this money was actually worth two million dollars in China," store personnel pointed out. "We figured it would take a family of six in China 1500 years to earn this amount if they saved all they made."

The engraving and paper of the money are better than United States money can boast, a local bank told the store. If the money were good it could buy all the jewelry on hand in Lane County stores.

The rate of exchange fluctuates so rapidly in China that if a man tried to save enough money to buy a ring, his money would be nearly worthless by the time he had accumulated enough for even a down payment, the store advised. Persons paid on Saturday in China often find on Monday that the money they earned is worth only one quarter of the value it had on payday.

"Inflation in this country isn't so bad," the store manager concluded.

Old Receipt Preserved In Strongbox
A 65-year-old receipt for a year's subscription to the Eugene Register-Guard was brought into the 1948 offices of the Register-Guard Friday by M. R. Wagner, Camp Creek. Dated September 23, 1883, the receipt was signed by Ira Campbell, editor, and made out to Wagner's father, P. A. Wagner.

The receipt was perfectly preserved, having been in a strong box for 65 years. The family home burned in 1921. Wagner told the Register-Guard, but the contents of the strong-box was saved.

The year's subscription cost Wagner's father \$2.50.
