New Navy Program to Aid Non-Veterans in College

Aptitude tests to select approximately 2300 candidates for 1949 college scholarships under the Naval Reserve officers training program will be given in the United States, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, and the Canal Zone on Dec. 11, 1948.

Educational institutions in the 13th Naval District in which NROTC programs are offered are the University of Washington, Seattle; University of Idaho, Moscow; and Oregon State College, Corvallis. Applications for the tests must be forwarded to Princeton University by November 15.

Request blanks to take the examinations may be obtained from high school principals, college deans, all Navy recruiting stations, professors of naval science at the

Universities of Washington and Idaho, and Oregon State College, or from the Naval Officer, Procurement Office, 513 Arcade Building, Seattle, Washington.

Candidates may indicate their choice of school, whether the school is within the 13th Naval District. Candidates selected will begin in the fall of 1949 at any one of the 52 colleges and Universities in which NROTC units are established. They may take any course leading to a bachelor or higher degree, but must include naval science subjects. Upon graduation the student is obliged to accept a commission in the Regular Navy or the Marine Corps if qualified.

Students enrolled in the program will be deferred from induction under the Selective Service Act pending completion of their academic courses. A four-year, government-subsidized education will be given successful candidates. The Navy pays for books, tuition, and normal college fees with a \$50-a-month living allowance.

Male high school senior or graduates, or college students between 17 and 21 are eligible to take the tests. Candidates must also meet prescribed physical and mental standards.

Lucy Loo Has The Last Word

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—From now on Mrs. Lucy Loo Nathan may live her life as she pleases, not by a set of rules typewritten by her husband.

Mrs. Nathan was granted a divorce from her husband, Robert, after she charged he made her follow a rulebook for 20 years of their married life. She got custody of their two children, Robert, Jr., 20, and Albert, 11, and \$100 a month alimony and child support.

Among the rules, she said, were the following:
"Loo to wear bathrobes at meals with Bob."
"Do not talk in the house after we see a show on Sundays or holidays."
"If Bob asks Loo for money, give it to him, but write it down."
"Loo not to say, 'You're not in good humor,' or anything to hurt Bob's feelings."
"Loo is to execute orders first, then suggest or ask questions."

In addition to a chart of personal conduct, Mrs. Nathan said her husband also prepared one governing her household duties. For a while, she said, she had to enter in the work chart the number of minutes it took her to do each task.

"I kept that one for one month," she told Judge Theresa Meikle. "Then I wrote across it, 'Finish!'"

Nathan told the judge she still loved his wife and asked Judge Meikle to deny the divorce. He had nothing to say about the rules.

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'Christmas' Boy Growing Older

CHEYENNE, Wyo.—(AP)—Tiny Foret "Nubbins" Hoffman, the early Christmas boy of 1944, is growing up.

Four years ago, when Nubbins was three, his parents despaired of his living. They fixed an early Christmas tree for him figuring he'd never make it until Dec. 25. The word got around and folks from all over the nation mailed him presents.

Now he has gained 20 pounds and stretched upwards about four inches in the past eight months. He now weighs 40 pounds and is 43 inches tall. Nubbins' parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marshall H. Hoffman, credit their son's rapid growth to injections of two and a half milligrams of male hormones in oil daily.

Physicians last February decided on the hormone treatments in an attempt to rebuild the child's kidney functions which had been damaged by a long illness brought about by a bladder obstruction. Christmas will come Dec. 25.

Duke of Edinburgh Asks Leave from Royal Navy

LONDON—(AP)—The Duke of Edinburgh, husband of mother-to-be Princess Elizabeth, asked for leave from the Royal Navy this week.

The duke was understood to have asked to be placed on half pay in order to spend more time with the princess.

King George, Queen Elizabeth and Princess Margaret Rose will be away for six months next year on an Australian tour and Princess Elizabeth will have to undertake certain engagements for their majesties.

Philip was reported to feel that he should be with his wife and their baby as much as possible during this period.

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Why Require Purchase Of a Bottle? Legalize Liquor By The Glass!

Let's quit kidding ourselves! Is it sensible to encourage the purchase of unlimited quantities of liquor by-the-bottle and at the same time have it illegal to purchase even so much as one drink of liquor by-the-glass?

Yet that is the situation in Oregon today... a situation the Oregon Liquor Dispensing Licensing Act (314 x YES!) is designed to correct by making it legal to purchase liquor either by-the-bottle in state liquor stores, as at present, or by-the-glass in state-licensed and supervised establishments.

For several months now, our state liquor stores have been holding "bargain sales" announcing attractive reductions in prices and encouraging the public to buy more liquor by-the-bottle.

One commissioner stated recently that as a result of this "merchandising" state liquor inventories had been reduced by some \$2 million.

Figures for the year 1947 show that in per capita liquor consumption Oregon, with its exclusively by-the-bottle system, consumed more per capita than seven of the nine states which offer the public the choice of bottle or glass.

Liquor by-the-glass, as well as by the bottle, was made available in our neighboring state of Idaho on July 1, 1947. Consumption declined immediately.

Idaho per capita liquor consumption:	
1946 (bottle only)	1.23
1947 (bottle and glass)	1.18

Some people think that consumption will decrease if you make liquor hard to get.

Actually, the harder a thing is to get, the harder people will try to get it. During the war, when liquor was scarce, did consumption decrease? No, it increased! Here are the figures: Decrease in Oregon Per Capita Liquor Consumption Since the War Years.

1945 — 1.77	1946 — 1.72	1947 — 1.62
