Hallins Have Word From Scandinavia Where They Visited

Contacts made in Scandinavian countries this summer are bringing letters to Mr. and Mrs. Hugo Hallin, 1358 High Street, who recently returned from a two-month tour abroad. A letter from former neighbors of Mr. Hallin's family was received this week.

Mr. Hallin, seventy this month, had not visited his former home at Visby, Sweden, on the island of Gotland, for fifty-eight years. He led his wife and daughter to the spot where his home had stood, but the house had been replaced by a new structure. He pointed out to them where he had played as a child, and the church where he had been baptized. None of his family remained there, and a search for the family of neighbors from whom he received word this week proved unavailing. He learns now that he missed them by but one house.

The family visited Stockholm, Rattvik, and Malmo, in Sweden; went to Norway, where cousins of Mrs. Hallin met them at Oslo with bouquets. They also visited Bergen in Norway, and went on to Copenhagen in Denmark.

Use of bicycles in place of cars impressed Miss Genevieve Hallin, but did not surprise her when she learned that the cost of gasoline, which is rationed, approximates ninety cents per gallon. She noted the tendency to live in apartment buildings instead of smaller homes.

The magnificent scenery of the northern fjords, and the preponderance of waterfalls is a lasting memory to Miss Hallin. They stayed mainly in hotels while on the trip and found food very acceptable, although lacking in variety of fruit and vegetables which are common here. They were served often with fish instead of meat, and with whale meat in one country, finding meat scarcer in cities.

Recipes

Fresh Shrimp Salad

Ingredients needed: 1 pound fresh shrimp, salt, mayonnaise, garlic catsup, celery, cucumber, 2 hard-cooked eggs, lettuce, green pepper. Method: Wash and drain 1 pound fresh shrimp in cold water. Put 1 cup water and 1 teaspoon salt in a medium-sized saucepan and bring to boiling drop shrimp into the water allow water to boil again, decrease heat and simmer for 5 to 10 minutes. Small and medium-sized shrimp will need about 5 minutes simmering until they are tender. Jumbo shrimp may need as long as 10. Drain, shell, and with a small sharp knife make a slit just under surface along back of each shrimp and lift out black vein. Slice each shrimp in two lengthwise and put into medium-sized mixing bowl. Add 1/8 cup mayonnaise flavored with garlic and catsup to shrimp along with 1/4 cup finely diced celery. To prepare mayonnaise cut a clove of garlic in two, impale halves on a toothpick and allow to remain in mayonnaise jar for several hours or overnight, then remove and add catsup—1 tablespoon to 1/4 cup mayonnaise is a good proportion. Separate a small head of lettuce, wash and dry leaves thoroughly. Place large outer leaves in middle of salad bowl and turn shrimp out on them. Surround with smaller leaves from heart. Pare a medium-sized cucumber and score with a sharp-tined fork. Slice 2 hard-cooked eggs and alternate with the cucumber slices in small lettuce cups. Sprinkle salad lightly with a few tablespoons of finely-chopped green pepper. Chill in refrigerator if not served immediately. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
