

Journalist Forecasts Long War in Holy Land

There will always be terrorism between the Jews and Arabs in the Holy Land, yet only in peace between the two is there much hope for either, is the opinion of a former Palestine editor who is now an instructor in Journalism at the University of Oregon.

John Lester Martin, 27, has a varied background with both factions and in drawing impartial views of the strife surmises that only in peace can the Israel of tomorrow rise as an industrial, trading and organizing nation leading the whole Middle East to new levels of productivity.

The youthful instructor, born in Budapest, Hungary, studied at the Hebrew University and American University at Cairo. He taught at Unmah College (an Arab institution) in Jerusalem, and brings a varied journalistic background to the local campus.

Wide Experience

Martin worked with the Iraq Times, in Bagdad; The Middle East Opinion (Arabian) at Cairo, where he was feature editor; The Palestine Post (Jewish); was a foreign correspondent for the Paris International Observer, and was assistant editor of the Palestine Illustrated News, Jerusalem.

In response to a question as to whether the Histadrut (General Federation of Jewish Labor) might tend toward Communist sympathies, the Middle East observer thought it "quite the contrary." The peculiar Socialism of Histadrut—a vast trust as well as a labor union and almost a state within a state—controls directly or indirectly 20 per cent of the country's economy.

Jews Want Peace

"The Jews wish to bring the struggle to a close as soon as possible and it is to their advantage to do so," Martin notes, adding there are 70,000 in the Arab army, which seeks to prolong the fight.

In event of a third world war, Martin sees little chance that the Arabs would be influenced into siding with Russia but feels instead that a quick truce would be made within the new-born nation.

Family Grudges

That terrorism will continue is based on the traditional reaction of the Arabs to a family killing. Many Arabs have been killed in the present conflict and Arab families, personally known by Martin, have avenged a relative's killing 300 years after the original incident.

"Blood feuds" are common and can be expected to continue, he contends.

This journalist, now in his second week in Oregon, left the disturbed new nation on May 7, one week before the mandate was established and on the last troop ship to leave. His home is in London, England.

Detroit Dam Bids To Be Called in Spring

PORTLAND —(AP)— Bids for the major part of Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River probably will be called early next spring, the Army engineers said Saturday.

Col. O. E. Walsh, district engineer, said reconstruction of the North Santiam Highway will be completed by next July. The Detroit Dam construction town of Mongold is already near completion.

A 230,000-volt power line will be brought into the dam site before the dam itself is built. The construction job is expected to take four years, and cost about \$58,800,000.

Red Hunter Asks Court Action

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. John McDowell (R-Pa.) Saturday urged prosecution of three lawyers and two alleged Communist spies for refusing to answer the questions of House investigators.

McDowell, acting chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee, said he will propose contempt citations against the five men. They have refused to answer committee questions about their activities because their replies might be "self-incriminating."

The three lawyers were identified as secret members of a pre-war Red underground among government employees by Whitaker Chambers, admitted ex-Communist. He did not accuse them of espionage.

Wallace Backers

They are: Lee Pressman—former Agriculture Department and Works Progress Administration attorney who later became general counsel of the CIO. No longer connected with CIO, Pressman is now a prominent member of Henry Wallace's Progressive Party. He helped write its platform.

John Abt—former Agriculture Department and WPA attorney, now general counsel of the Progressive Party.

Nathan Witt—former Executive Secretary of the National Labor Relations Board, now engaged in private law practice in New York. The two alleged Communist

All six men refused to answer committee questions, relying on the fifth amendment to the constitution. The amendment says no one "shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself."

The witnesses refused to tell the committee whether they were Communists, or had engaged in espionage.

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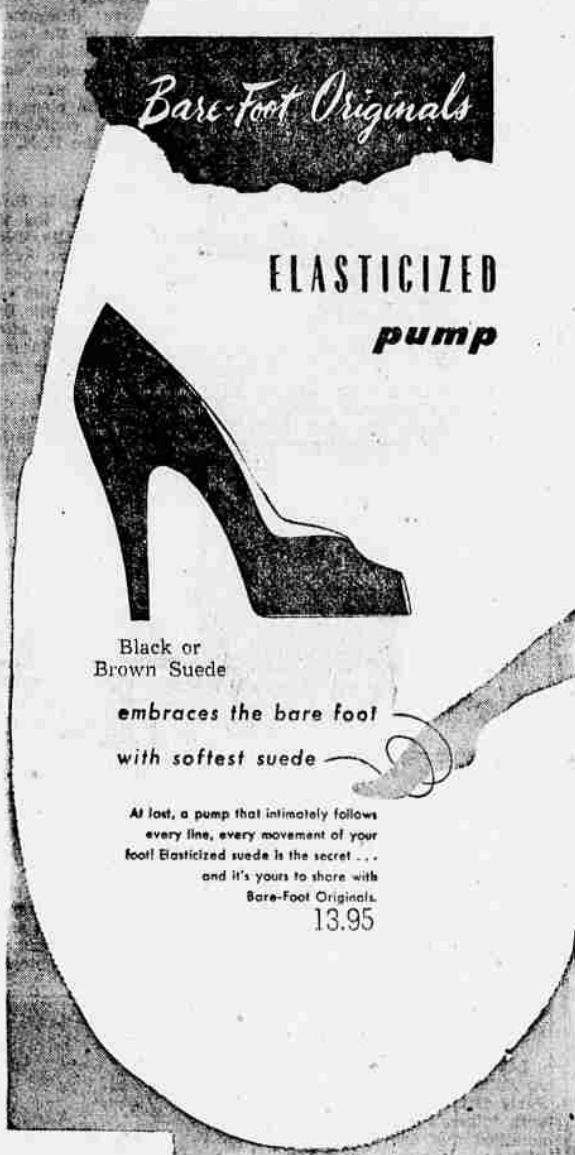
