general election.

'Crowd-Mindedness' Blamed For Most Cases of Insanity

"Crowd-mindedness," or the
failure of men to speak their con-
victions before they find "which
way the wind is blowing," is
largely responsible for the fact
that one-tenth of all the people
living today will occupy a bed in
a mental hospital sometime during
their lives, the Rev. Wesley G.
Nicholson told members of the
Kiwanis Club Monday noon.

Speaking before the group as
part of the observance of Kiwanis
Loyalty Week, the local Congre-
gation minister told club members
that men must harmonize their
lives into a unit and organize their
lives around a steady conviction
before they are able to live
at peace with themselves, each
other, and the world.

"A man's emotions, intellect and
whole being must be coordinated,
because if one part goes wrong,
the whole mechanism is thrown
off balance," Mr. Nicholson said.

"Also, let us ask ourselves if we
are passing as copies of others, or
swept by currents of public opin-
ion, or letting others think for us.
There are few persons in politics,
religion, business or other walks
of life today who are willing to
venture a straightforward opinion
before seeing which way the wind
is blowing."

The speaker termed this atti-
tude "crowd-mindedness," and in
comparing the personalities of
Erasmus and Luther pointed out
that while Erasmus had probably
the greatest mind of his time, he
had a facile personality and the
ability to argue either side of a
question equally well. Luther, he
said, was not as brilliant, but was
guided by principles, and stood
upon those principles when he
had made up his mind. Erasmus
died frustrated and unhappy, Mr.
Nicholson declared.

These two types of men exist in
every generation, the speaker
emphasized, and the chief prob-
lem of men today is how to over-
come this crowd-mindedness. Peo-
ple today avoid trouble and un-
popularity by avoiding the issues,
the minister believes.

Government Can Stop Inflation, He Says

CHICAGO — (U.P.) — The govern-
ment can stop inflation any time it
wants to, a University of Chicago
economist contends.

Garfield V. Cox, dean of the uni-
versity's school of business, told
the management institute for
smaller business that additional
taxes and tightened bank credit
policies and postponement of pub-
lic works construction could stop
rising prices.

It is doubtful, however, that the
administration would call for those
measures in an election year unless
a much larger portion of consum-
ers is hurt by inflation, he said.

"If the boom continues in 1948,
a new federal administration
might, however, decide that it pre-
ferred to run the risks of checking
the boom early rather than taking
a chance on its collapsing of its
own weight late in the presidential
term," he said.
