Government Tuesday asked for court order barring the International Typographical Union from seeking to compel hiring discrimination against non-union printers under its contracts with New York newspaper publishers.

Counsel for the National Labor Relations Board made the same request with respect to ITU's contracts with newspapers at Buffalo and Syracuse, N.Y., and those of the Gannett group, including Gannett papers at Rochester, N.Y., and Danville, Ill.

The request was contained in the NLRB's final brief and proposed decree in the NLRB general counsel's contempt case against the printers union.

No Room to Die In Singapore

SINGAPORE (U.P.)—There is no room to die in Singapore's squalid filthy Chinatown.

There the density of population runs over 400 to the acre, mostly housed in two-story dwellings divided into innumerable dark, air-less cubicles.

Hence, establishments which cater for the dying are experiencing a boom.

In the houses, euphemistically termed "hospitals," "nursing homes" or "houses for the reception of the sick," a person whose life has been despaired of is received for \$20. The service provided while the patient is yet living is limited to permission to occupy a few feet of floor space.

If food is required, it must be brought in by relatives. If the patient survives more than ten days, another \$20 has to be paid.

House Cashes In

But it is after the hapless wretch has lost his or her feeble grasp on life that the home proprietor can expect something worth while in the way of profit.

There is a coffin to be brought, floss sticks and papers are required for burning and the services of priests and nuns must be engaged.

If the relatives are comparatively well-to-do (and not all Singapore's cubicle dwellers are short of money) there may be catering arrangements for parties of night visitors. They sit through the small hours playing cards and mah-jongg, thus keeping evil spirits at a respectful distance. Evil spirits will not approach light or noise.

Well Lighted

The death houses are brilliantly illuminated by fluorescent lighting for the same reason and they are kept tolerably clean.

The purchase of all the funeral appurtenances are the making of the arrangements usually are left to the home proprietors, who add a percentage to the cost.

A simple funeral may cost no more than \$50 or \$100 (Straits); an ostentatious one engaging many priests and several bands will run into thousands.

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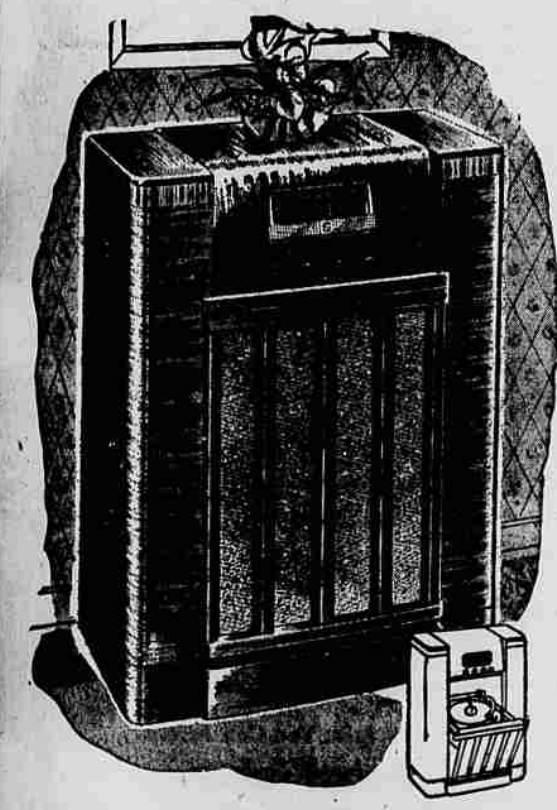
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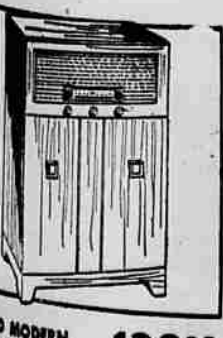
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Yowling Cat Saves 2 Lives
