

Sees 'Partnership' as Key

United States is strong enough, no power would dare start war against us. "Communists are realists," he continued, and would shy away from armed conflict with a powerful nation.

Without mentioning names Gov. Warren delivered a verbal attack against efforts to pitch "class against class, religion against religion, and section against section." The only result of this kind of talk, he said, would be disunity and it "is a disservice to the nation."

He said that while he was critical of the Democratic administration, he did not mean to impugn the motives of anyone in the government.

"But after 16 years, they are tired and quarrelsome. The Democratic party has Wallace on the left, the city bosses in the middle, and the Dixiecrats on the right," he added.

He said that as president, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey would ask himself one question before acting: "Is it good for the country?"

Increase Noted In Forest Use

Recreational use of the Willamette National Forest for 1948 exceeds 1947 by at least 10 per cent, according to Roy Elliott, assistant supervisor of the Willamette National Forest.

He said this was perhaps the heaviest use of the forest in history, and he credited the increase primarily to the general slackening of closures by the Forest Service in order to allow as broad use as possible consistent with good administration and protection of the National Forest.

Elliott estimated 200,000 visits will be made during 1948. He broke some of these visits down in the following groups: 47,000 in picnic areas and organization camps; 30,000 visits to winter sports; 41,000 visits to hotels, resorts, recreational residents, and wilderness areas; 82,000 visits will be made by sightseers on highways and railroads traversing forests primarily for recreational purposes.

There were nine man-caused fires during the summer, which Elliott pointed out, is a good record considering the increase in visitors. Of the nine fires only three were recreational fires—two from abandoned campfires and one from smoking.

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A F M, Manufacturers Seek End to Ban

NEW YORK.—(U.P.)—James C. Petrillo, head of the American Federation of Musicians, (AFM), held a "preliminary" meeting with record manufacturers Wednesday in an attempt to end the nine-month-old union ban on the making of recordings.

Petrillo and the AFM's executive board will meet with the manufacturers again Thursday.

"This was a preliminary meeting seeking a way to lift the record ban," Petrillo said after the conference. "No demands were made and none of the proposals advanced were considered binding. Both sides are seeking a settlement."

The AFM decided against making records after Jan. 1 because the Taft-Hartley law forbade the established practice of paying royalties into the union's welfare fund. Petrillo has suggested that the practice might be continued if the fund were operated outside union jurisdiction.

Among the record manufacturers represented at the meeting were Capitol, Columbia, Decca, King, MGM, Mercury and RCA-Victor as well as some representatives of phonograph manufacturers.

Lane Youths Nab Honors At Pacific International

Joan Forstrom, Eugene, won a prize for a party dress she made at the 4-H contests at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland Monday.
