

Four Appointed To Library Staff

Four new appointments to the library staff of the University of Oregon will round out the staff for the fall term, according to Librarian Carl W. Hintz.

Mrs. Constance Watson, graduate of the University of Washington school of librarianship, comes to the university as a catalog librarian. Formerly she was assistant librarian, Texas College of Arts and Industries. William F. Lindgren will also be a catalog librarian. He received his under-

graduate training at the University of Minnesota, and also took special work in library, receiving a degree in library science.

Miss Helen Katherine Erickson has been appointed reference librarian. She was formerly an Army librarian in the European Command. She was graduated from the University of Washington school of librarianship.

New as senior circulation librarian is George F. Jones. He was graduated from Columbia University school of library service and then became associated with the Vancouver, B. C., public school system. During the war he served with the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Less Spending In Far Nations Now in Thoughts

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Some high officials here believe this country may have to cut down on spending for foreign economic recovery if it launches any effective program of military aid to western Europe.

Responsible persons in Congress and the administration are convinced that any lend-lease of American arms to the five-power western union defense organization must be more than a "token" gesture.

But they are equally convinced that the U. S. already has gone about as far as it can safely go in foreign spending.

That is the problem that must be solved before a contemplated program of American military aid for western Europe can be sent to Congress early next year.

Some persons closely connected with spawdwork on the project believe the solution can be found by working it in with the European Recovery Program. In plainer language, they believe recovery spending may have to be trimmed if world security requires more military spending.

The issue was stated publicly Monday night by Chairman Arthur H. Vandenberg, (R-Mich.), of the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee. Referring to the problem of foreign assistance, Vandenberg told a nationwide radio audience that:

Not Overreach
"We dare not—and we shall not—overreach ourselves and our resources in this behalf. If we did, the lights of liberty would falter here and everywhere. But we shall not deny every practicable cooperation . . . this is the surest route to any peace that can endure for us and others."

Current top-drawer planning envisages the shipment of U. S. planes, arms and other equipment to the western European defense alliance established last spring at Brussels. It already has received the promise of support from President Truman. Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, the Republican presidential nominee, likewise has indicated he favors U. S. backing of European efforts toward unification.

Truck Driver Gets Fortune

SCRANTON, Pa.—(AP)—Out of "3 Just Right Place" came a male Cinderella story.

It's actually the address of 52-year-old truck driver Walter Pearson, father of five. And Pearson had a story to top the sweepstakes winners, the radio quiz programs and what not.

He'd inherited exactly \$363,000, a 14-room stone mansion in Montreal, Canada, and a hunting and fishing lodge on the shores of Lake Ontario.

Last June, Pearson related, a man stopped at his home, announced he represented a law firm in Montreal, and did he have an uncle in Canada?

"I told him I did," said Pearson, "and he told me I would hear from him later."

He did hear later. "They told me my rich uncle died up in Montreal and I was named his sole heir. Later I went up there and found out it represented \$363,000, the stone house and the lodge."

Pearson, said the uncle, a bachelor, came to Canada about 80 years ago and made a fortune in the brewery business.

"I'm going to keep right on working," Pearson told reporters.

Census Reports Show Oregon Population Up

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A census bureau report estimates that Oregon's population increased 49.2 per cent between the 1940 official census and July 1, 1948, to a total of 1,628,000.

Washington showed a 43.4 per cent gain to 2,487,000, and Idaho went up one per cent to 530,000.
