Silo Building Show Scheduled for Coast

A demonstration on how to construct a wooden-stave silo will be conducted Thursday and Friday, Oct. 7 and 8, at the Warren Shober farm, on Mercer Lake. The construction work will be supervised by M. G. Huber, agricultural engineering specialist, Oregon State College, and W. B. Parker, county extension agent.

The 30-foot-high silo will take four men about two days to complete except for the top. It will be 12 feet in diameter made of 2 x 6 tongue and grooved material, and no scaffolding will be necessary. Parker says the cost of materials for the silo will be approximately one-half the cost of a commercial silo of similar size.

Plans for building such a silo may be obtained through the county extension agent's office in Eugene. Anyone interested in a silo of this type is invited to attend.

Eskimos Lost On Long Trip

NOME, Alaska — (AP) — Thirteen American Eskimos were reported long overdue Wednesday on their annual trading trip across the Bering Straits to the Siberian mainland.

The report came from a radio operator, Roger Menadlock, on little Diomed Island in the middle of the straits.

He said that the island storekeeper, Elmer Elsanga, and a dozen other men left the American island early this summer traveling in a large native skinboat. They were to go to the nearby Siberian Diomed Island and then go on to the Soviet mainland, he added in reports to Nome. The mainland is only about 40 miles away at the nearest point.

The radio operator said the group is now more than two months overdue.

He said one old native on the little American island thought that the group might have been caught in ice floes, always prevalent in the straits, and been unable to return. Others, he said, discounted the view.

Trib Says Dewey Is 'Least Worst'

CHICAGO — (AP) — The Chicago Tribune Tuesday night announced its support of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, Republican candidate for president.

The Tribune, in an editorial entitled "Why we're for Dewey," stated:

"We are for Gov. Dewey. We are not for him because anything he has said or done since his nomination, which we opposed, has caused us to change our basic opinion of him. We are for him because, borrowing one of Westbrook Pegler's better phrases, we consider him the least worst of the candidates."

Old Shop Fixed Up For UO Art Students

Some 950 students in the University of Oregon school of architecture and allied arts are attending classes in a renovated building that was once a university shop.

The building, renovated to take care of lower-division requirement courses, has been divided into four studios equipped with the latest type lighting facilities and heating installations. To be known as the school's annex, the made-over shop is "ideal" for drawing because of its lighting, according to Dean Sidney W. Little. Floor area covers 12,000 square feet.

Most of the rooms have been newly equipped, but sound control and lecture facilities are yet to be completed, the dean said. A permanent staff of five has been assigned to the annex, and other instructors will assist.

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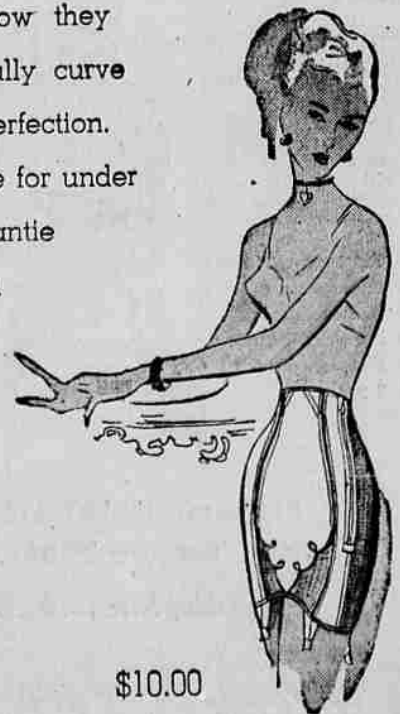
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
