

Ashida Quits Jap Cabinet

TOKYO —(AP)— Prime Minister Hitoshi Ashida, assuming "Moral responsibility" in a growing government scandal, resigned Thursday and his entire cabinet fell with him.

Japan's parliament, the Diet, has been summoned into special session next Monday to select a new prime minister. Ashida's coalition cabinet, in office since last March, will stay on the job until a successor is named.

The fall of the sixth post-war government followed a conference between Ashida and General Douglas MacArthur, presumably to obtain occupation approval to resign.

Took a Long Time, But It's Coos Bay Now

Council to Hear One-Way Plan

will be continued on Fifth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Aves. to facilitate the movement of cars in or out of the grid system. Parking will be prohibited on the narrow portion of Eleventh between Willamette and High Sts.

Use of Lights

The plan also contemplates the most advantageous use of traffic light cycles to promote a steady flow of traffic through the downtown area.

Inside the "grid zone" cars will be permitted to turn into the proper traffic flow on all intersecting streets. For example: a driver moving south on Willamette would be able to turn right (west) on Sixth, Eighth or Tenth. He could turn left (east) on Seventh or Broadway. If he continued to Eleventh or Thirteenth, he would have the option of turning either direction.

Experts Consulted

Chief Jones told the Chamber-council committee Wednesday that traffic management experts of the Oregon State Highway Department were consulted regarding the committee's initial plan to combat the worsening downtown traffic situation.

The state engineers, Jones reported, pointed out that designation of Willamette St. for northbound traffic—the original plan—would force the use of High St. for traffic in that same direction should the one-way grid plan later be fully adopted. In that event, traffic movement on the eastern edge of the business district would be out of phase with

the new highway route through that section and opposed to the natural character of High St. as an arterial for northbound traffic.

Chief Jones also advised the group Wednesday noon that the state's experts believe the full one-way grid system will handle up to 60 per cent more traffic than the current street-use pattern.

Hazards Reduced

Jones also said that accident records for one-way Sixth and Seventh Aves. have proved that elimination of direct traffic opposition permits much safer traffic movement. A normal intersection of two-way streets creates 28 situations in which collisions may occur, the chief said, but this number is reduced to three if the intersecting streets each carry only one-way traffic.

Speaking for the Oregon Motor Sales Co. at the Wednesday meeting, Carl Wendt told Chairman William Lush and other members of the committee that the new proposal would speed bus service as well as other vehicular movements.

New Bus Stops

If the one-way system is adopted, Wendt said, inbound buses will discharge passengers on Olive homeward bound riders on Willamette St.

A. F. Richards, Chamber of Commerce member of the joint committee and chairman of the city planning commission, told the Wednesday meeting that the planning agency now is nearing completion of a city-wide arterial street development proposal. This project will dovetail with the one-way handling of downtown traffic, Richards said, and if it is adopted will help correct the fast-building problems of cross-town traffic.

A previous agreement that 5-cent parking meter periods on Willamette St. should be reduced to 30 minutes was left in force Wednesday.
