Chamber Sees More Prosperity

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The immediate outlook for continued prosperity is "very strong," the U. S. Chamber of Commerce reported Thursday. The report, prepared by Dr. Emerson P. Schmidt, the chamber's director of economic research, is optimistic in tone though it says some "soft spots" are beginning to appear in the national economy. "If, as investment in manufacturing facilities begins to shrink, the investment funds can be diverted into housing and service establishments, prosperity is certain to continue," the chamber said. Outlook Strong "The immediate outlook for ceiling or capacity production and employment is very strong." The Chamber of Commerce report noted as a favorable sign that although profits are high, business concerns are continuing to borrow additional funds, and no income is being hoarded. The economic survey coincided with a federal reserve board report that business loans reached a \$15,239,000,000 peak during the week ended Sept. 29. Record Building Among other signs of continuing prosperity reported by the Chamber of Commerce were record housing construction, the development of new industries, and improvements in agricultural technology. "In spite of these bullish factors," the report said, "more soft spots are beginning to appear. Price declining grains have reached or approached the artificial government supported price levels. The future market in most grains is lower by substantial amounts than the cash market. Some coal mines are operating on a short work-week. The same is true of some textile mills."

British Say Spanish Factions Now Agree

LONDON — (AP) — The British Foreign Office announced Thursday Spanish Republicans and Monarchists, both foes of Generalissimo Francisco Franco, have patched up their differences in a formal agreement. Official sources in Paris said the two factions agreed on formation of a coalition exile government which will ask Western Power backing to throw out the Franco regime. A copy of the agreement has been received at the British Embassy in Paris, and it was also to be presented to American and French representatives. American sources said the U. S. State Department will give it "fullest consideration." Britain, with the support of the other two Western Powers, was reported to have demanded such a coalition as a condition for recognition. The Western Powers have not recognized the present exile Republican regime. The United States, Britain and France pledged themselves in March, 1946, to aid any satisfactory caretaker government which might be installed to replace Franco, pending free elections.

Nationalist Retreat Denied

NANKING — (AP) — Government military spokesman Thursday denied that the Nationalists had evacuated Changchun, northernmost government pocket in Manchuria. The spokesman, Lt. Gen. Teng Wen-Yi, said that part of the garrison was launching an offensive southwards but that most of the defenders were remaining inside the city. Teng said the so called "evacuation" of the onetime Manchurian capital was not a fact and that the ministry of defense was merely referring to a sortie of some government units to the southwest when it "confirmed" the report Wednesday night. These units, he said, reached points about six miles outside of Changchun and had not reached or by-passed Szejingkai 4 miles south as reported. Teng confirmed the government recapture of the important steel center of Anshan in the south Mukden pocket. He characterized the fighting in the Northeast as heavy, adding that Communist Gen. Lin Piao had moved 10 armies against the beleaguered coastal corridor linking North China with Manchuria. Teng confirmed the fall of Yih-sien Oct. 2, saying six or seven Communist divisions overcame the government garrison of one division, using more than eighty large caliber guns on one artillery brigade. Attorney Carries Fight To Save Youth's Life

RENO, Nev. — (AP) — The fight to save 18-year-old David Blackwell of Tacoma, Wash., from Nevada's lethal gas chamber will be continued, Defense Attorney Ernest Brown announced Thursday. Earlier this week, the Nevada Supreme Court turned down the Blackwell's appeal of his murder conviction. His attorney had contended a year ago in a hotel room as they ed he had been placed in double jeopardy because a trial judge had disqualified himself after hearing Blackwell's guilty plea. Brown said the state supreme court would be asked for a re-trial of the appeal plea within the next 15 days. If the motion is denied, Brown said, the case will be carried before the U. S. Supreme Court on a writ of certiorari. Blackwell was convicted of killing two Reno police officers nearly a year ago in a hotel room as they ed he had been placed in double jeopardy because a trial judge had disqualified himself after hearing Blackwell's guilty plea.
