He was later graduated from Stevens Technical Institute at Hoboken, N. J., with the class of '05. He was a veteran of the Spanish American War, World War I, a member of the Masonic Order, American Legion, and American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He was a registered engineer in Michigan, Ohio and Pennsylvania and a member of the Reserve Officers' Assn. He retired to the honorary reserve in 1942.

After his retirement in 1944 he moved to Eugene. He had been called to Texas as a consultant engineer and was fatally injured in an auto accident before reaching his destination.

Surviving are his widow, making her home at Rt. 4, Eugene, with a son; two sons, Karl, Rt. 4, Eugene, and Frederick, Ann Arbor, Mich.; two brothers and six grandchildren.
